PAINTERS OUT ON STRIKE.

Guelph Union Men Want 25 Cents an Hour.

Guelph, March 4.-Some six months ago the painters of the city notified the Master Painters that after the 1st of March the schedule wage would be 25 cents an hour on a two-year agreement. R. H. Barber and the Royal City Painting and Decorating Company signed the agreement. All the other shops went out on Monday, probably comprising between 20 or 25 men. There is little prospect of a settlement at present.

EXTENDING ITS FIELD.

Bank of Commerce Takes in Halifax Banking Co.

Toronto. March 4.-The nouncement comes from Halifax that a provisional agreement has been made under which the Halifax Banking Company is to be amalgamated with the Canadian Bank of Com-This will give the Bank of Commerce fifteen additional points in Nova Scotia, including Halifax, Truro and Windsor, and two in New Bruns-wick, at St. John and Sackville. The directorate of the Halifax Banking Co. directorate of the Halifax Banking Co. will continue as a local advisory board and the entire staff will be taken into the employ of the Bank of Commerce. The Halifax Banking Company was established in 1825 and incorporated in 1872. Its paid up capital is \$600,000 and its rest \$525,000. It has deposits of \$4,000,000 and assets of \$6,000,000. The Bank of Commerce will assume all the liabilities of the Halifax Banking Company and will give \$700,000 par Company and will give \$700,000 par value of stock for the excess of assets over liabilities. It is announced that this sum will doubtless be taken from this sum will doubtless be taken from the \$2,000,000 extra stock which the Bank of Commerce intends to issue. When the amalgamation has been completed, probably in April, the Bank of Commerce will have a paid up capital and rest combined of nearly \$12,000,000 and total assets of some \$80,000,000, with 101 branches.

KILLED BY KNAPP.

The Body of One Victim Found in a

Hamilton, Ohio, March 4.—Although Edward F. King has failed to identify positively the body of the woman found in the river as his sister-in-law, and a wife of Alfred Knapp, who has confessed to the murder of five wo-men, the impression is strong that the body is that of Hannah Goddard Knapp, his third wife. The matter of Knapp, his third wife. The matter of identification is extremely difficult, owing to long immersion. In every particular the body was found to tally with the minute description given by Knapp in his confession, when he said he murdered the woman and threw her into the Miami at Hamilton, Ohio, Dec. 22. The body was embalmed today.
