There are now eight circuits within the area comprised in the old Wallace circuits in 1846. There were only five then in the county. There are now seventeen.

As this old Wallace circuit was my birthplace in 1821, I am able to speak more particularly of it than of any other in the county. Though forty-three years in active service, I never occupied a circuit in my native land, though often requested to do so.
