they who ever experienced the difficulties of an administion that can feel the full import and meaning of what I sayHills were to be levelled, and vallies were to be filled, and crooked ways were to be made straight, and rough wa plain. A people full of faith and of Irish enthusiasm had : many wants to be provided for in their new home. Their ws were to be enlarged, their sympathies expanded and corolled, a holy and honourable ambition was either to be creed within them or quickened into action. A whole body opriests was to be raised up to meet the crying wants of a ng derelict people. Churches were to be built in every parof the country; schools and religious establishments were toe introduced, and Catholic worship carried out in all the syndour of the older countries in Europe. In a word, a people aget unformed, a heterogenous mass of different races, having to sympathy in common but that of the one faith, were to be rought together, and organised and made conscious of their me position in the country, of their inalienable rights on the oneide, and the means of attaining them on the other; and need tell you that it was Dr. Walsh alone who, by his life-inspirig genius, and a zeal and energy which had no limits, succeeded in accomplishing all this within a single lifetime, nay whin a few years, and before the eyes of those who now her me. It was he who raised up Halifax to the successive agnities of a Bishopric and an Archbishopric; it was through him, and his great influence at Rome, that Halifax beame first known to the-Catholie world on both sides of the Atlantic; it was during his administration that it became as if the heart of the surrounding provinces, and that the life pule which beat so warmly and vigorously here, sent a corresponding throb to the remotest ends of Cape Breton, Prince Edvard's Island and New Brunswick. The prestige of his great name became a tower of strength for us throughout the lower British Provinces; for where is the Protestant, friend or foe, who did not do homage to his character? where is the Bishop or Priest or Catholic Layman, who did not feel a secret pride in having such a man as the representative and champion of our creed? where is the man among thousands, upon whom the mantle of his genius and his many virtues can fall, and who will be in every way worthy the lofty position of which he was the shining
