OLD BOYS

The Reunion Project Will be Enthusiastically Pushed by Good Citizens—A Meeting.

The Chatham old boys' reunion scheme, which was taken up at the latter part of last year, and then abandoned will be pushed again this year, and it looks at present as if the project will be a success and that Chatham will have an old boys' reunion on July 1. A public meeting will be held next Friday evening in the Garner House, when the matter will be fully discussed. "At the meeting, held last summer," said F. F. Quinn to The Planet this morning, "it was thought that the 1901 would have to be abandoned for the 1902 on account of the lateness of the season and so the meeting was postponed until the new year. I have called the meeting for Friday night, when we will see what can be done towards securing this project." Mr. Quinn was appointed President pro tem., and J. M. Pike, Secretary. At the meeting Friday night committees will be appointed and officers elected.

SUNDAY PAPERS

Their Delivery on the Sabbath Again Causes Police Court Investigation.

This morning James Fitzsimmons, the fourteen-year-old son of Hugh Fitzsimmons, appeared before Judge Houston to answer to a charge of distributing papers on Sunday. The information was laid by P. C. Tom Groves. He laid it first against the father, but being unable to find him, he then laid another information against the son. The witnesses were many, including the Maple City Mayor, Capt. Sim Smith, W. D. Tristram and Mr. Kelly, watchman at the G. T. R. crossing. They all testified that the papers had been delivered to them on Sunday.

W. D. Tristram testified that he had got a paper from Fitzsimmons but that he had refused to take money for it.

Honora Ramsey and Sam Johnson testified that they carried papers on Sunday for Fitzsimmons and were paid for their work always on Monday.

G. E. Douglas, for the defence, said that he had no evidence to offer, but that he wished to argue the case. He urged that the defendant didn't come within any of the classes of persons mentioned in the Lord's Day Act, and further, no sale had been proved. Judge Houston pointed out that the information was not laid for selling, but for delivering.

Mr. Douglas claimed that the persons engaged in the business mentioned in the Act were those who held liable.

He cited the case of Regina v. Sumner, where, in 1894, a cab-driver was convicted by Magistrate D. Toronto. The case was argued by Judge Armour and Falconer, who granted the appeal on the ground that there was no doubt but that the driver was not within the meaning of the law, as he was simply a servant.

Judge Houston reserved judgment in the case till Monday.

John A. Walker was acting as attorney.
