BLOODSHED IN WARSAW

Nearly 100 Persons Killed or
Wounded By Troops.

After Cavalry Had Demoralized the
Workmen's Procession of Several
Thousands With the Flat of Their
Swords, Infantry Fired Volley Af-
ter Volley in the Shrieking, Fleeing
Multitude-Firing Was Unprovoked.

Warsaw, May 2.-Nearly 100 people
were killed or wounded in disturbances
in various quarters of Warsaw yes-
terday. The troops apparently were
uncontrollable and violated all orders
to act with moderation. They fired into
crowds of demonstrators, and workmen
in retaliation resorted to the use of fire-
arms and bombs. What approaches a
reign of terror existed last night; the
city presents a most gloomy aspect,
and the temper of the entire commu-
nity augurs ill.

May-day opened with every prospect
that the recent gloomy forebodings
would find contradiction in a peaceful
ending. The presence of numerous pa-
troles of Cossacks, cavalry and infantry
were the only reminder of lurking
danger. The first disturbances occur-
ed between 1 and 2 p. m., when a
procession of several thousand work-
men, carrying red flags, marched along
Zelazna street. Suddenly several squad-
rons of Uhlans appeared, but without
interfering with the procession, and
took up a position along the sidewalks
while the workmen passed through the
lines.

Shot Into Fleeing Multitude.
Then a company of infantry ap-
proached from the front and immedi-
ately the cavalry charged into the pro-
cession, driving it with the flats of
their swords into a disorganized mass.
When the cavalry withdrew, the infan-
try fired a volley, whereupon the de-
monstrators turned and fled. The in-
fantry continued to discharge volleys
into the retreating shrieking multitude.
Thirty-one persons were killed and
many wounded, and of the latter it
is believed that fifteen will die.

The shooting is described as having
been quite unprovoked. It has aroun-
ded the most intense indignation among
all classes in Warsaw. Many of those
who were killed or wounded were shot
in the back, showing that they were
running away when they were struck.
Another terrible scene was enacted
at 5 o'clock p. m., at the corner of
Zelazna and Sonora streets, when work-
men fired from behind a wall at a pa-
trol, which immediately opened fire on
the passing crowds, killing or wound-
ing twenty persons.

First Bomb Throwing.
The first bomb-throwing occurred at
5.35 o'clock last night, when a bomb
was thrown into a Cossack patrol near
the Vienna station. Three Cossacks and
one policeman were killed, and two
ladies, who were leaving the station
at the time, were severely wounded
by the explosion of the bomb. Cos-
sacks and infantry fired a number of
volleys, and it is reported that many
persons were killed or wounded.

At 10.45 p. m. disturbances broke
out at the Zombokowska gate of the
suburb of Praga, a cross of the Vistula
River. A great crowd had assembled
there, threatening the troops, when
Russians fired upon the crowd and killed
four and wounded many others.

Shooting at Lodz.
It was reported by telephone from
Lodz yesterday afternoon that a crowd
there had stoned a military patrol,
whereupon the soldiers fired and killed
two men and wounded a boy. Later
a similar scene occurred in Balucki
Square, in Lodz, when two persons
were killed. In Lodz, at 9 o'clock last
night, a bomb was thrown at a patrol,
but it was not effective. The patrol
fired into the crowd and killed three
and wounded two persons.

A student who was distributing pro-
clamations in Wola, a suburb of War-
saw, last night, was killed by a pa-
trol. In Nawrot street, Warsaw, last
night, a patrol killed a woman.

Anarchists Parade in Toulon.

Paris, May 2.-Labor Day was ob-
served throughout France. The trades
union of Paris held a monster meet-
ing and adopted resolutions in favor of
an eight-hour day. Disorderly manifes-
tations occurred at Brest and Etienne.
At Toulon, anarchists marched in a
procession, carrying a red flag, chant-
ing a revolutionary hymn, and bearing
a banner inscribed, "Remember the
victims of capital at Chicago, Linnoges
and Martinique." An affray occurred
in front of the naval arsenal, during
which several workmen were slightly
injured.

May Day in Toronto.

Toronto, May 2.-The only distur-
bance in local labor circles on May Day
was caused by the lathers, about 100
of whom went out on strike for an
increase to \$2.50 for an 8-hour day.
They had been receiving from \$2.35 to
\$2. A conference was held yesterday
afternoon between the lathers and the
bosses and a two-year agreement signed,
by which second-class men will be
paid \$2.75, and first-class men \$3.10, a
slight increase for the skilled laborers.
Thirteen sheet metal workers employed
by W. L. Phipps & Sons also went out,
because they were refused an increase
of 3-1-2 cents, from 25 cents, which was
granted by other firms.

extent of about \$1,000,000. The plant
is owned by the Seigel-Cooper Co. of
New York.

Victim of Yellow Fever.
New York, May 2.-A despatch re-
ceived here from Panama announces
the death there from yellow fever of
Chief Architect Johnson, attached to
the canal staff.
