IRON AND STEEL

BOUNTIES ON WIRE RODS AND PLATES.

Reduction of the Sliding Scale Postponed—Newfoundland Ores Do Not Share in the New Terms—Bounties on Binder Twine Also Provided For.

Ottawa, July 9.—The Government's policy in regard to the iron and steel duties was announced last night. Wire rods, which are not now made in Canada and are on the free list, will, when manufactured here, earn a bounty of \$6 a ton, on condition that they are sold to the steel wire men to undergo further finishing processes. The idea of this is to secure the establishment of a new industry in Canada. A bounty of \$3 per ton will also be paid on large-sized steel plates and structural iron when produced in Canada. At present these plates are not made here, and they enter at the low duty of 10 per cent, while structural iron is subject to a duty of 35 per cent. The reduction of the sliding scale of iron and steel bounties is postponed for one year. In 1897 the Government took power to grant the following bounties:—On steel ingots, \$3 a ton; on puddled iron bars, \$3 per ton; on the proportion of pig iron produced from Canadian ores, \$3 per ton; on the proportion of pig iron produced from foreign ore, \$2 per ton. In 1899, however, it was enacted that these bounties should be paid yearly in the following proportions, and cease in 1907: 1902-1903, 90 per cent; 1903-1904, 75 per cent; 1904-1905, 55 per cent; 1905-1906, 35 per cent; 1906-1907, 20 per cent. The effect of the suspension is that 20 per cent of the duties will be paid in 1903-1904, as well as during the fiscal year which has just closed, and thereafter in the following increased proportions: 1904-1905, 75 per cent; 1905-1906, 55 per cent; 1906-1907, 35 per cent. The announcement that the Government would grant a bounty of three-eighths of 1 cent per pound, equal to the rebate which the American manufacturers enjoy, was made by Mr. Fielding in his budget speech.

The Government have decided not to treat the Newfoundland ore as a domestic ore in regard to the duties payable, although the Dominion Iron & Steel Company made an application to that effect.

The Governor in Council may authorize the payment of a bounty to any corporation, firm or person manufacturing binder twine in Canada, such bounty to be equal to the amount paid as export duty in the Philippine Islands on Manila fibre produced in such islands and used in the manufacture of binder twine in Canada.

Such bounty shall only be payable in respect of binder twine manufactured on or after the 1st day of September, 1902. Provided, however, that the bounty shall not exceed three-eighths of one cent per pound on the Manila fibre so used in the manufacture of binder twine. The Governor in Council may make regulations to carry out the intention of this act.

THE DOOMED THIRTEEN.

Another of the Members Has Been Exterminated.

Boston, Mass., July 9.—The Armenian colony here is greatly excited over the shooting of Peter Kureghian, a classmate of President Loubet of France, and editor of The New Armenian, a paper published in this city. The shooting was done, by Samuel Gahlelian, who is now under arrest and who refuses to say anything about himself. Mr. Kureghian was shot in Dudley street, in the presence of hundreds of persons, and his assailant was caught by a policeman. It is expected Mr. Kureghian will live, and the third attempt to bring about the extermination of the thirteen members of the Armenian revolutionary organization in Boston, will end in failure. Two members are already dead, according to statements made by Armenians here.

DEATH OF A. F. GAULT.

Head of Gault Brothers of Montreal.

Montreal, July 9.—Mr. A. F. Gault, one of the merchant princes of Canada, died yesterday at his summer residence, "Glenbrook," on Lake Memphremagog, aged 70 years. He had been ill for a long time of Bright's disease, and therefore, his death was not unexpected. Early this spring he went to the old country, hoping to benefit by the change, but the result was not very gratifying, and upon his return the trouble seemed to develop, until a few days ago acute symptoms set in. The remains were taken from the summer home to Magog; this morning, in the private yacht, Actina, and a special train completed the journey to this city. Accompanying the remains were the widow, Mrs. A. F. Gault, Mr. Hamilton Gault, the only son of the deceased, Mr. P. G. R. Benson of England, son-in-law, and Mrs. Benson, formerly Miss Lillian Gault, the only daughter. The funeral will take place on Friday afternoon from the family residence to St. George's Church, thence to Mount Royal Cemetery. Bishop Carmichael will officiate.

BULGARIA BACKS DOWN.

Prince Ferdinand Will Make No Further Preparations.

Vienna, July 9.—As a result of urgent representations from Austria and Russia, Prince Ferdinand has given the strongest assurances that Bulgaria will make no further military preparations against Turkey.
