# THE AMERICAN LEGION

The fine development of the American Legion in Canada is at once an indication of American sympathies with Great Britain and her Allies in this war and a partial recompense for a similar service done to this country by the Dominion more than half a century ago. The part which Canadians played in the Civil War is not as fully and as accurately remembered as it should be. There are those who think of nothing but the refuge which was there given to Confederates and the Confederate flag which they served is testified against the Union. These were not pleasant for us to contemplate, but it must be confessed that they were within the limits of neutrality, so that we had no valid reason for complaint or protest.

The fact is, however, that Canada or Canadians gave us much very practical aid in that war. Nearly 50,000 Canadians entered the Federal army and served loyally and efficiently under the Stars and Stripes. By the fact that about two-fifths of their number were killed or wounded. It is true that these Canadian levies were not generally recognized, and that they have been so much forgotten that comparatively few Americans now remember that they were in our army at all. That is largely because they did not form regiments of their own, but were incorporated as individuals in our own United States regiments; but that fact makes their devotion to our cause the more noteworthy and admirable. They were not seeking distinction and glory, but simply the preservation of the American Union, and they were willing to do their work in obscurity and unnamed.

The Americans who have enlisted in the British army in Canada differ from these in that they have formed a regiment of their own, which is known as the American Regiment. It has grown to such numbers that it will presently be reorganized as a brigade, and it is not unlikely that a second brigade will before long be formed. It is interesting, too, to observe the composition of this body. In its ranks are to be found university graduates, men of large fortunes and men of social distinction, all of whom have become "Rookies" and "Tommys" for sheer devotion to the cause of the Allies against Kultur.

It would doubtless be a brave "brave" to enlist to enlist to this legion in this country. But there is no law forbidding Americans to visit Canada and while there to enroll themselves in the American Legion. To what extent it is legally permissible for citizens of this country to send to that legion contributions toward its equipment is an interesting question. But doubtless those who, while not able to enlist themselves, would like to feel that they have in some way aided to the efficiency or to the comfort and safety of those troops will find a method of doing it which will not involve them in trouble with the Department of Justice. Certainly the career of the legion will be enriched with interest by multitudes in this country who have no personal interest in or relationship to any of its members, but who instinctively sympathize with the spirit which led Kosciuszko and Pulaski hither from Poland, and Lafayette and De Kalb and Schuylkill hither from France, for the last named, though a German, came from France and under French patronage. The soldiers of this legion are not mercenaries nor soldiers of fortune, but rather knights errant, offering their lives, without hope of distinction or emolument, for a cause which they believe to be the cause of America as well as of Great Britain, and in a superlatively sense the cause of humanity and righteousness. — Boston Transcript.

—Paris, Feb. 14.—Reports of the loss of the French cruiser *Amiral Charner*, which was reported to have been sunk by a submarine while patrolling the Syrian coast, were confirmed to-day. According to information received at the French Ministry of Marine a raft bearing one the sailor and fourteen of his companions had been picked up off the coast of Syria. The rescued man said the *Amiral Charner* was sunk on the morning of February 8. There was no time to use the lifeboats.

Yesterday it was announced that no news had been received from the *Amiral Charner* since February 8, when according to a German telegram, a submarine had sunk "a French warship."
