## LIVINGSTONE WAS HONORED

England Paid Tribute to the Great Hero Missionary Yesterday.

(Canadian Press Despatch)  
NEW YORK, March 20.—A London cable says: The Livingstone centenary was celebrated in various parts of the country yesterday. At a memorial service in Westminster Abbey, the explorer's only surviving daughter, Mrs. Livingstone Wilson, placed a floral tribute on his grave. The Archbishop of Canterbury in the evening presided at a celebration in Albert Hall. He said Livingstone made the very fibres of the nation tingle with his quiet heroism. Sir Henry Johnston, referring to the fact that Livingstone was for fifteen years in the service of the foreign office, which published very little of the valuable information contained in his reports, said that when he thought of Livingstone's treatment, he sometimes felt ashamed to wear the ribbon of the Order of St. Michael and St. George. Premier Asquith in a letter referred to Livingstone as a man whose memory would never perish.
