WILL BE ENTERED FREE

U. S. Customs Collector to Be so Instructed

There should be no More Trouble at the Boundary About Entering American Goods.

In connection with the many disputes which have occurred at the American boundary line between miners going into the Fortymile district and the U. S. custom collector the following letter now on file in the U. S. consul's office will prove interesting.

"Due notice of the terms of this document should be taken by all who intended taking goods into the lower country. The Honorable the Secretary of State. Sir—I have the honor to acknowledge receipt of your letter of the 20th instant, enclosing for my consideration and as expression of my views, a copy of a dispatch No. 288, and dated the 20th ultimo, from the consul of the United States at Dawson City, N. Y. T., in regard to the action of the deputy collector of customs at Fortymile in requiring miners to present certificates of exportation of American goods from the United States as a condition precedent to the free entry of such goods on reimportation at such port.

In reply, I have to state that the action of the deputy collector is based upon department's regulations of October 19, 1899, copy herewith, which provides for certificates of exportation for returned American goods. It will be observed that such circular empowers collectors to waive such certifications where the value of the goods does not exceed \$100 and the policy of this department is to deal liberally in the matter of evidence required for returned domestic goods, under the provisions of paragraph 384 of the act of July 24, 1897, such evidence of exportation is uniformly waived by the department on presentation of evidence showing that it is impractical to produce such certificates. The collector of customs at Sitka will be furnished with a copy of this letter and directed to instruct his deputies to allow free entry of American goods in the nature of utensils, miners' outfits, tools, etc., when satisfied as to the domestic origin of the goods irrespective of their value, and without requiring certificates of exportation, as the law provides for the free entry of articles of domestic origin returned to the United States upon proof of identity as such, but under the provisions of section 4 of the act of June 20, 1890, where the goods are valued over \$100 a consular declaration of the foreign exporter will be required.

An Important Ruling.
Washington, Aug. 14.—Attorney General Knox, in an opinion rendered at the request of the secretary of the treasury, holds that a Chinaman may engage in the manufacture of goods for sale and still be considered a merchant in the sense in which that word is used in the treaty and laws relating to the exclusion of Chinese, where the mercantile part of the business is either wholly or in part, the selling of goods manufactured. The number of a firm at San Francisco engaged in the manufacture and sale of cigars and the question raised is whether this Chinaman

may be readmitted into the United States as a returning merchant. The attorney general holds that he is entitled to admission. In the course of his opinion the attorney general says that he does not think that a manufacturer as such is entitled to admission into the United States, nor is he disposed to think that a bona fide merchant is any less of merchant because he is also a manufacturer.

The attorney general has also held that all Chinese persons, who have a right to be in the United States as evidenced by valid certificates of residence or registration, are entitled to pass from the United States to the Hawaiian islands and to be protected while there by their registration certificates as they would be in any organized territory of the continental and integral domain of the United States. The attorney general, however, specially limits his opinion to this one question and does not pass upon their right to return to the United States. He also strictly limits his views of the liberty of passage of Chinese persons to the parts of the United States to this particular case, which submits the case as affecting this particular territory of Hawaii.

Will Assist Strikers.

New York, Aug. 9.—President Samuel Gompers has pledged the American Federation of Labor to the support of the Amalgamated Association of Iron and Steel Workers. After a conference with President Shaffer, lasting the greater part of two days Mr. Gompers issued a statement in Pittsburgh tonight upholding the position of the Amalgamated Association, and pledging the moral and financial support of the federation in the strike against the United States Steel Corporation. The steel corporation made an aggressive move by ordering the Dewes wood plant at McKeesport should be dismantled, and removed to Kiskiminnis valley on account, it is said, of the sympathy of the officials and citizens of McKeesport with the strikers. It was also said that the plant of the National Tube Company, at McKeesport, will be abandoned and the plan for a tube plant at Conneaut, Ohio, revived. President Shaffer's order for a general strike goes into effect tonight. Estimates of the number who will be idle vary, the strike leaders placing the figures as high as 175,000.

While the steel strike situation continued to interest men in the financial district of this city, less talk about it was heard there. Apparently Wall street was wanting to see what would be the effect of President Shaffer's order to the Amalgamated Association to extend the strike, and learn if the American Federation of Labor would take an aggressive attitude in support of the strike. Well-informed financial men said they did not believe the federation would do more than give financial aid to the steel strikers. As to President Shaffer's order, it was said its effect could not be foretold with certainty, and there was an evident disposition among the financiers to cease guessing until the order goes into effect tomorrow night.

Steel stocks declined a fraction of a point, closing at 41½ for the common and 30-7-8 for the preferred. Brokers said the operations in steel stocks indicated suspense and nervousness, but not a loss of faith in the steel corporation's ability to handle the strike.

Running Match.

J. T. Browning has issued a challenge to A. D. Frew to run one hundred yards for \$50 a side. The time and place are to be decided upon later. By the terms of the challenge \$100 is to be deposited immediately and the balance at least 24 hours before the race occurs. Browning, who issues the challenge, resides at Grand Forks.

Judge Craig Leaves.

Justice Craig left last night on his winter vacation. He goes first to his home in Renton county, and will afterwards visit New York and western cities and finish his holidays in Southern California. He is expected back in March.

From Koyukuk.

John Harris, of Emma creek, Koyukuk, came up last night in a canoe. He says the country is good, but that there is a dearth of provisions just now. He further says that it is foolish for any man to go into the country without a good supply.
