

FINDING OF THE CORONER'S JURY

Inquest Concerning Death of Trainmen Presided Over by Dr. Thomson—Many Witnesses—The Verdict

The coroner's inquest concerning the death of the victims of the C.P.R. wreck, which occurred near here on Oct. 30th took place before Coroner Thomson in the city hall on Saturday evening. The jury were James Brown, foreman; T. R. Jones, Lionel S. Gurney, R. L. Gregg and W. H. Mulligan. There were fourteen witnesses examined, including eight railway employees, three passengers and two doctors, as follows: Samuel Worth, trainmaster at Moose Jaw; Andrew W. Caswell, operator, Regina; George M. Hays, conductor of freight train; Albert J. Smith, engineer of freight train; Benjamin T. Woods, fireman of freight train; James L. Converse, brakeman of freight train; Arthur W. Wilson, passenger brakeman; R. E. Mickleborough, Regina, passenger in local; Arthur F. O'Connell, R.N.W.M.P., passenger in local.

Clement J. Hogg, corporal R.N.W.M.P., John Black, M.D., Regina. The lawyers present were: Norman Mackenzie, for Alexander the passenger conductor under arrest; Alex. Ross, for the crown, and Hon. F. W. G. Haultain, for the C.P.R. The police were represented by Inspector Heffernan.

The first witness was Dr. Nyblett, who recited his attendance on the three wounded men at the station, assisted by Dr. Black.

S. Worth, at Moose Jaw, trainmaster, gave evidence as to the operation of trains. The conductor and engineer are jointly responsible for the safety of trains, and under conditions not provided for in the rules they must take proper precaution for protection. The passenger train could not leave the siding till after the time named in the order, and if the freight train could not make the siding in the given time, her conductor should put flagmen out at both ends to protect himself.

Freight Conductor George M. Hays, the freight conductor who jumped to save his life, was put in the witness box. He told of approaching the eastbound local express on the morning of Oct. 30th. They were to be into clear at Fushimi at 7.55. They were a little over a mile from the siding when the accident occurred. When he first saw the other train he thought it was a house as there was some fog, when he discerned the engine he told the engineer to give her the top notch and jump, this meaning to put on the emergency brakes. They all jumped and escaped.

Freight Engineer Engineer Smith of the freight train said: "I cleared Pilot Butte at 8.44 or 45. We had proceeded beyond the mile board at the siding when I saw

a dark object looming up. I could not make out what it was, but when I saw a train coming, I put on the brakes and we slowed down to fifteen miles an hour. The other train seemed to be coming at the same speed all the time. I jumped and rolled into the ditch."

B. J. Woods, the fireman of the freight, and T. H. Converse and J. L. Converse the brakemen gave evidence of a similar nature, but they had not noticed the time until after the accident. Converse noticed 70 pounds pressure on the brakes.

Passenger Brakeman Arthur Wilson, brakeman on the ill-fated passenger train, stated that at the time of the accident he was in the diner taking breakfast. He had seen the order that morning which said that "Engine unknown will wait at Fushimi till 8 o'clock for 1413." They had left Regina twenty minutes late. They were running about 18 miles an hour because of the heavy grade. He did not see the conductor at the time of the accident. The engineer did not give a signal that he heard.

R. E. Mickleborough, W. J. Hill and Constable O'Connell were on the passenger train and gave evidence. Mr. Mickleborough had just handed his ticket to the conductor when the crash took place. He did not hear a signal whistle blow. Mr. Hill did not hear any whistle blow. The constable told of going out after the accident and comparing watches with the freight conductor.

Corp. Hogg, R.N.W.M.P., gave evidence as to the position of the fireman's body when taken from the wreck. Witness thought victim was trying to escape by way of the tender, but his foot was caught. He was horribly mutilated.

Dr. Black told the jury of treating Robinson the express messenger who took stimulants, but who had his ribs broken and was bleeding internally. Witness thought Robinson died from puncture of the liver.

This closed the enquiry and the jury retired after which they brought in the following verdict:

"We, the jury, find that Edward Brett and Norman J. Robinson came to their deaths as the result of the collision between the C.P.R. local No. 6 and extra No. 1413, about one mile east of Fushimi siding, at eight o'clock on the morning of Wednesday 30th October, 1907, and from the evidence produced before them this jury is of the opinion that local No. 6 did not stop at Fushimi siding in accordance with instructions received at Regina, and this was the cause of the collision. This jury recommends that better protection be made by the railway at all train crossings or sidings having no station nor flagmen for the greater safety of the public."

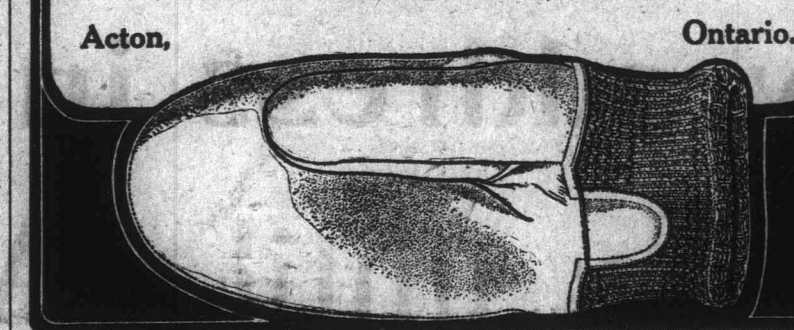
