is the metropolis. It is a novel sight indeed for the "tenderfoot," as they here term all new-comers, to see the large numbers of half-breed freighters, some with their single ox and cart, others with bronchos, single and double, hitched together in long procession, heavy laden, for a long prospect miles north, from which points the goods are distributed, when some are shipped to places two thousand miles further north, by boat, on the Mackenzie and other rivers. This short lived, as the Calgary Edmonton road will probably be completed in 1891. The road running to the Boundary Line via Fort McLeod is also likely to be completed shortly and looking ahead to this, there is already a real estate boom here, though as yet the investments are perfectly safe and constantly increasing. Two Elks Lodges have been formed in supplying light to the town. Two daily papers give additional light and two excellent hotels, assisted by those of lower grade and numerous saloons, make many others also appear bright at times. The general business of the town has become far too extensive to be described in an epistle such as this, but as Mr. Brown of the Dominion Illustrated, is not the photographer and writing up the letters for that paper, those who chance to see it will doubtless be given a good idea of Calgary. Among other prominent business places photograph was that of an old Newboro boy, Mr. John Hutchings, of the firm of Hutchings and Biley, wholesale and retail saddlers, who are carrying on one of the most lucrative businesses in the town. Mr. B. is the former partner in business with his brother in Winsipeg, came here about two years ago and set up a business of this kind, taking in his present partner some six months later, and by his assiduity and business push has built up a saddlery business larger and more profitable than is to be found in your country town to-day.

There is just two things the Territories are at present yearning for and those are, more such energetic Ontario men and more freedom from the C. P. R. monopoly, and the fact is they are gradually obtaining both. Immigration and rapid railway building are seen on every hand and those who have suffered are in great rejoicing. You will understand what I mean when I tell you that a passenger link-up from Portland, Oregon, to Chicago with Eastern people, as this notorious "Down East" would be a happy lot to find here. The beautiful empty city, so filled with Eastern people, as this notorious "Down East" fancies that the cowboys shoot off a shot at the red painted buildings and the night hideous.
