The scheme of cancer research adopted by the Royal College of Physicians has been formally approved by the Royal College of Surgeons and may now, remarks The British Medical Journal, be regarded as "in

A fund of £100,000 is to be raised, and steps are to be taken : To provide, extend, equip, and maintain laboratories to be devoted exclusively to cancer research. To encourage researches on the subject of cancer within the United Kingdom or in the British Dominions Beyond the Seas. To assist in the development of cancer research departments in various hospitals and institutions approved by the executive committee, and generally to provide means for systematic investigation in various other directions into the causes, prevention, and treatment of cancer. The fund will be administered by a presient, vice-presidents, five trustees, honorary treasurer, general commit-Effervescent tee, and executive committee. The latter will control the income of the fund, which is to be expended on the above objects, including the assignment of funds for the erection or extension of laboratories or for the equipment of any existing laboratory in which investigations are or shall e pursued; for grants to individual workers in other laboratories, or elsewhere; for investigations other than those in laboratories; collection of statistical, dietetic, to-pographical, and other information. The working staff will also be appointed by the executive committee consisting of a superintendent of in-vestigation and his assistants.


