



A Weman Who Has Made a Fortune In Building Railreads.

Mrs. Theodosia Beacham, builder of railroads, fills a unique place in the field of woman's endeavor. She is said to be the only woman in America, perhaps in the world, who has engaged to a large extent in the construction of the great steel highways. She is in a class of one. She has made railroads blasted rocks, dug up primeval forests, cut through the foothills, filled in the valleys and reared bridges in something like half a score of states. She has directed men and mules, and steam and dynamite have been forced to serve her ends. She has figured on contracts whose prices ran into hundreds of thou-sands of dellars. Her intellect and financial ability have been matched against some of the country's greatest railroad magnates, and she has not suffered by such encounters. She is a per son of pluck and energy, of finance and

Mrs. Beacham was born fifty-two years ago in Kalamazoo, Mich. Her maiden name was Reynolds. She mar-ried when twenty-two years old F. L. Beacham, who is yet living, but who has been an invalid for several years. She has two sons, Claude and Erwin, whose ages are respectively twenty-eight and twenty-five years. Mrs. Beacham has been taking railroad contracts for more than twenty years, the past few years, during which her greatest achievements have been wrought, having been spent in the southern

Though Mrs. Beacham declined to tell what her yearly earnings are, it was learned from other sources that she makes \$40,000 and upward annually. Mrs. Beacham says her biggest contract was with the Tennessee Central railroad in 1900. She made about \$75,000 or \$80,000 on that, and it took nearly a year to do it.—Washington

The New York Herald has the folowing special despatch from Toronto: "In Toronto the statement attributed to Prof. William Osler about chloroforming people reaching the age of sixty has never caused the same amount of discussion as it aroused elsewhere. The reason is that the Osler family is a remarkably long lived one, and Prof. Osler often traveled many miles to minister to his father, the late Rev. F. L. Osler, who died only a few years ago, well up in the nineties, leaying a widow who is now in her one hundredth year. "Prof. Osler has just traveled from

Old Oxford to Toronto to satisfy him-self whether science cannot still help lengthen her days. Other records of great longevity in the Osler family are well known here; hence it is that Torontonians have always been satisfied
that the beared professor was joking
when he hade his famous assertion.
"Prof. bler's brother, Mr. E. B. Osler, Conse ative member of Parliament
for Toront. West, has already entered

his sixtleth year, but he shows no sign of accepting his medical brother's views on chloroform or any other means of exit from this world. Not only does he refuse to believe in the chloroform destrine, but he laughs at the very idea of a man going out of business at sixty. He has recently fought a successful election campaign, fulfilled his duties of director of the Canadian Pacific Railroad and Steamship Co. and of sev real big financial concerns, and spends from eight to ten hours in his broker's office on such days as he is not at directors' meetings.
