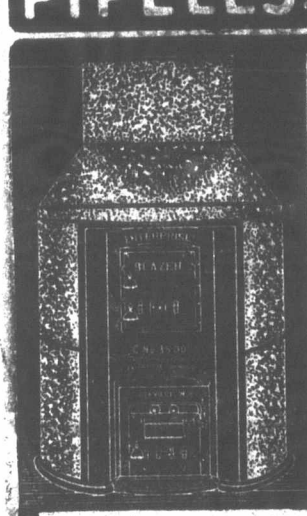

BEULAH MARIA KIMBALL

Beulah Maria Kimball, younger
daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Frank T.
Kimball, of Fort Fairfield, died at the
home of her parents Wednesday eve-
ning, Aug. 5, after a long illness of
tuberculosis.

Miss Kimball was born in Fort
Fairfield April 19, 1896. She was a
member of the class of 1914 at the
Fort Fairfield High School, but was
compelled to leave school in the ju-
nior year because of ill health.

In February, 1913, she accompanied
Mr. and Mrs. Roy L. Kinney, her
brother-in-law and sister to Felle-
mers, Florida, where she regained
her health, afterwards attending Stat-
son University, Deland, Fla. one
year. She then returned to Fort Fair-
field after nearly two years' absence,
remaining over a year, when she be-
came a victim of tuberculosis.

At her request her parents took
her to Fellemers, Fla., last winter to
be near her only sister, Mrs. Roy L.
Kinney, but her health gradually
failed, so her mother and sister
brought her home June 26, since
which time she failed rapidly until
the end came at midnight August 5.

The funeral service was held at
the home Friday afternoon at 2 o-
clock, all details being carried out as
the deceased had requested. Rev. H.
Smith, pastor of the Reformed
Baptist Church was the officiating
clergyman, who spoke sympathetically,
using for his text the 23rd Psalm.
Prayer was offered by Rev. Guy L.
Wilson. A quartet composed of Mrs.
Robt. Slipp, Miss Alma Slipp and How-
ard and Wm. Cogswell furnished the
music, while the pallbearers were
the three brothers, Lawrence, Beryl,
and Hollis Kimball, and three cous-
ins, Jean, Leroy and Herrick Kim-
ball. The flowers at the funeral were
numerous and beautiful.

During the last few weeks of her
illness, Miss Kimball was tenderly
cared for by Mrs. Elson Roach,
trained nurse of this town.

Miss Kimball was a devoted Chris-
tian girl, being especially interest-
ed in Sunday School and Christian Endeav-
or work. She leaves behind many
firm friends in Fellemers, Fla., and
her home town, who sincerely regret
that a life so beautiful in every way
should be cut off at so early an age.

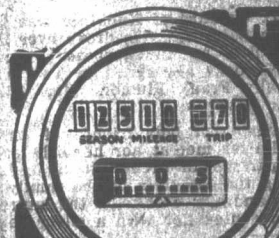

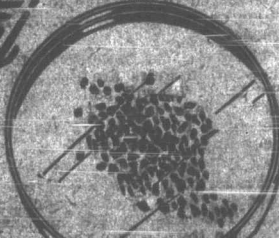

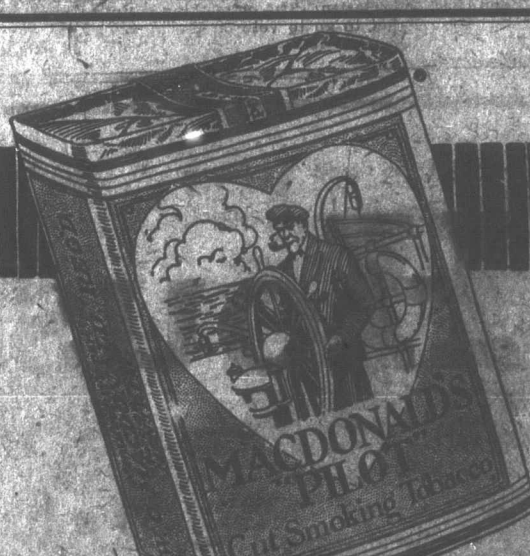
