CERMANY PUNISHING RUSSIA

Dispute Over Interpretation of New Commercial Treaty

Russia's Action at the Algeciras Conference

Was Not Pleasing at Berlin, Hence the Aggravation.

Berlin, April 6—The relations between Germany and Russia appear to be a good deal more strained than has been indicated even in recent articles in the German press, which have spoken of considerable fiction.

The National Zeitung says to-day the serious differences have arisen over the interpretation of the new Russo-German commercial treaty. It also repeats the report that the German Government has refused to lend its support to a new Russian loan in Berlin.

There seems no doubt that the situation is primarily due to the attitude of the Russian delegates at Algedras. It is evident that Germany expected Russia to throw over her ally at the conference and to support the German contentions. Why this expectation was entertained remains a mystery, but it is certain that Russia's behavior caused intense disappointment in the Wilhelmstrasse.

CANADA'S REVENUE

Increase of More Than \$5,500,000 Over Same Period Last Year.

OTTAWA, April 6—Canada's revenue for the nine months of the fiscal year ended March last shows a total of \$57,-015,562, an increase of \$5,584,794 over the same time last year. The ordinary expenditure was \$41, 706,380, aud increase of \$2,986,015. The capital expenditure was \$9,146,-337, an increase of \$757,308. All classes of revenue shows large increases.

There was a decrease of about \$600,000 in subsidies.

For the month of March there was an increase in the revenue of \$1,329,000 and an increase in the expenditure of \$1,315,032.

There was a decrease in the expenditure on capital account of \$241,255.
