Any even numbered section of Dominion Lands in Manitoba. Saskatchewan and Alberta, except ing 8 and 26, not reserved, may be homesteaded by any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years of age, to the extent of one-quarter section of 160 acres more or less.

Application for entry must be made in person by the applicant at land is situated. Entry by roxy may, however, be made at an Agen cy on certain conditions by the father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of an intending homesteader.

With the domestic coal supply dwin iling at the rate of 400,000000 tons a year and the foreign supply disappearing at an equivalent rate, the problem of the fuel supply takes on more than an academic interest. The Engineerthe matter out pretty thoroughly

It is all very well, it states, to in quire profanely what posterity has done for us that we should forbear skinning the earth's resources on its account, but from the present outlook this mat ter has ceased to involve waiting for posterity. It has reached a point where there may be trouble within the life-time of children now alive.

If the coal consumption of the country increases at anything like the preent rate it will probably not be more than a quarter of a century before the calamity of far dearer fuel will be exhausted by then, but that scarcity, ong transportation and deep mining will co-operate so to enhance the price of coal as to completely modify present conditions

The coal famine of a few years since shows the disastrous result of even a slight shortage in forcing up the price What would be the industrial situation with steam coal at \$10 and up wards per ton permanently?

It is not a pleasant thing to contemplate, and yet such is the situation which confronts us in the non-distant future. It will not be long before low grade bituminous or lignite. A large part of the fields yet remaining untouched, are, in fact, the meanest transportation.

There is not enough wood left t cut any figure in the industrial situation. Of peat, good, bad and indiffcrent, there is a large amount, but thus far all attempts to get it into utilizable shape on a large scale proved somewhat futile. The hydraulic power available at rea

sonable cost of utilization is being rapidly taken up. Even if 10,000,000 horse power were in good shape for a Dominion Lands Agency or Sub profitable development, it would at agency for the district in which the rough approximation relieve the present coal consumption by only some thing like 10 per cent. while that consumption has risen 30 per cent. in less than five years. Hydraulic power then, valuable as it is, can be regarded anly as a small auxiliary.

This time he was so weak that he gave up, but the cold water revived him and he made another effort and again climbed up the bank, catching hold of a small tree which he held on to for two and a half hours, until help arrived.

In the meantime Marshall, who was in a dazed condition walked to camp where he with some difficulty told of the accident. Currant Cake. Two eggs one-third cup of butte cup of sugar, one-half cup of sweet milk, one cup of currants, two teaspoons of baking powder, one pint of flour.

Boil with two carrots in salted water, until the bones will slip out easily. Dish up on hot platter, garnish with the carrots, and serve with melted butter or white sauce, in which a dozen of oysters have been cooked.
