MANY PASSENGERS HURT.

One of the Worst Wrecks in History of Newfoundland Railway.

Halifax, N. S., March 13.—The steamer Bruce, arriving at North Sydney to-day, had over one hundred passengers, the majority of whom were suffering from injuries received on the Newfoundland Railway yesterday, in one of the worst accidents in the history of the Reid road. Many passengers were obliged to remain at Port Aux Basque, with injuries so serious as not to permit of their continuing their journey.

The accident occurred six and a half miles from Port Aux Basque, when most of the passengers were asleep. The train was moving rapidly along when the engine and forward cars rolled over and over, hurling men, women and children from their berths in the tangled wreckage. None were killed outright, although the cook on the train received injuries which are likely to prove fatal.

Wm. Bebekov, going to Alliston, Mass., had his head badly cut, and his wife and child were also severely injured. One girl, bound for Vancouver, had her face covered with bandages, her teeth having penetrated her lips. Andrew Snow, en route to Fernie, B. C., had his arm badly dislocated. MR. LEMIEUX THANKED.

Ottawa, March 13.—Members of the Central Committee of the Canadian Postmasters' Association, now in session in Ottawa, waited on Hon. Rodolphe Lemieux, Postmaster-General, last afternoon, and presented him with an address declaring on behalf of the postmasters of the Dominion hearty appreciation of the generous and business-like treatment accorded them by the present Postmaster-General. "We appreciate," says the address, "the increase in pay granted as being the most sweeping change made since the present system was established at the time of confederation."

The committee urged that recent changes in the method of remunerating postmasters for handling money orders was working to the detriment of many postmasters, especially those who have to issue orders for settlers of foreign extraction.

Hon. Mr. Lemieux thanked the committee for the kindly wording of the address, and promised to do all he could to remedy any grievances of the postmasters still existing.
