TO REPEAL SCOTT ACT

The petition for the repeal of the Scott Act in Carleton Co., will, according to law, be filed on June 15th with the Registrar of Deeds for Carleton County. Twenty-five per cent. of the voters have signed the petition. The petition remains with the Registrar for ten days, so that all who care to do so can examine the names, after which it will go to the Secretary of State, who will fix the date for election.

SHOCKING ACCIDENT AT MILLBANK

When William Lloyd of Millbank was riding into the fire house of the Pulp Mill on the front of the coal car, Saturday afternoon, he forgot the steel girder just inside the fire house door, and his head was caught between the top of the car and the steel girder and crushed. Dr. B. A. Marven was immediately summoned and pronounced death to have been instantaneous. Coroner M. S. Benson was notified and he proceeded to the scene of the accident and held an inquest into the cause of the unfortunate man's death. The jury returned a verdict of accidental death and found that no blame could be placed on any person. The young man was about thirty-two years of age and leaves his wife and one child to mourn, who have the deep and sincere sympathy of the community in their sad loss.
