HALIFAX, Oct. 29.—It is reported that the Indians are still besieging Oroomah.

A hurricane swept over Great Britain and Ireland on Wednesday night causing great destruction of property; ships, houses, roads and bridges were much damaged. The lowlands were flooded.

Four missionaries have been murdered by the Zulus.

Hamburg is now in a state of siege. General Garibaldi is said to be seriously ill.

One hundred vessels were destroyed at Copenhagen by the gale of Friday.

Nine Land League meetings were held on Sunday.

Revolution is spreading in South Africa and the situation is extremely critical.

Oroomah has been relieved by the Persian troops.

The youngest daughter of the King of Greece is dead.

The Republican candidates Garfield and Arthur, have been elected President and Vice-President of the United States. The Stepduncans carried New York, Maine and the doubtful Northern States. The solid North defeated the solid South.
