The parliament buildings were beautifully illuminated, and the scene in the Assemby Chamber during the presentations and in the Council Chamber afterwards, when the ball was in progress was extremely attractive. During the reception Lord and Lady Aberdeen occupied the Speaker's dais which had been extended on each side for the occasion, and were supported by Governor and Mrs. Fraser; Major Campbell, A. D.
