> Land Settlement the Act is to be amended and the terms made nuch more favorable than at present. Full information on this subject will be available at an early date. Every Province has at present a large number of cent unoccupied farms and it the desire of the Dominion that these farms shall not lie idle but shall be made available for settlement. For this purpose it is proposed that each Province should have the power to expropriate these lands if found necessary, in order that they may be available for pur-Soldiers in the matter of borrowing money to improve and purchase farms, also for the pur chase of stock and implements are very liberal.
