A Council meeting of the Board of Trade took place last evening. Capt. W. Winsor became a member. A discussion arose about freight shipments from Montreal. Mr. W. A. Munn, who lately came back from that city, said that the Black Diamond line intended to discontinue running their steamers employed on the route last year and would likely sell them off. They would replace them by two larger steamers, up to date, which would carry freight only. They expected to be able to reduce the freight rates from \$1 to 40 cents a ton. They will endeavor to make an arrangement to secure other steamers and build up a much larger tourist traffic than has prevailed hitherto.


