The world's record was set cently by a Vancouver diver, who ma a descent in a suit (his own invention) composed of aluminium, with ballbearing joints and artificial hands. He worked at a depth of 396 ft., where, owing to the rigidity of his dress, the pressure inside was only 40 lb., to the square inch, whereas it attained 170 lb., on the outside. The inventor claims that with his dress it is possible to work at a depth of 500ft., and in normal circumstances to sleep in comfort on the bed of the ocean.

No less important have been the improvements in other types of apparatus. A feature of one of the most recent inventions is provision for living

and moving on the sea floor. The object of this invention is the raising of sunken ships-an object which has been achieved quite often by sinking caissons or canvas tubes, affixing them to the wrecks, pumping out the water, and then filling th lifting the ships to the surface. Under the new system the same principal is applied, but the actual raising is effected by means of multiple

The Kiel Canal.

The famous canal across Schleswig-Prescription "A"-small & large Holstein, northwestern Germany, s commonly known as the Kiel Canal. taking this name from the port of Kiel Essence Ginger Wine.

However, when the canal was completed it was given the name Kaiser Wilhelm Canal, and by that name it was officially known until the downfall of the Empire upon the defeat and surrender of Germany in the autumn of 1918. The canal extends from Brunsbuttel, on the Elbe River, to Holtenau, on Kiel Bay, thus uniting the North Sea with the Baltic. Its length is 61 miles. Construction was commenced in 1887, and in 1895 the canal was completed having a bottom breadth of 72 made with straps, which are fastened

In 1908, owing to the construction Do you want your choice of a of larger battleships, work was commenced to double the bottom width and increase the depth to 36 feet. This work of enlarging and deepening was completed on June 14, 1914, six weeks before Germany and Austria launched their raid upon the world. The ports connected with the canal and the canal itself afforded harborage for the German High Seas Fleet during most of the war. By the Treaty of Versailles the canal was made free and open to the vessels of all nations at peace with Germany on terms of en-

Kiel harbor, near the Baltic entrance to the canal, was the German naval base. The great shipyards, which created most of the German navy has been dismantled; floating docks and other equipment have been moved away to compensate the Allies for damages sustained by Germany illegal submarine warfare on merchant shipping. The great batteries covering the Baltic entrance to the canal have been reduced to heaps of crumbled concrete and twisted steel, and the great guns have been broken up and thrown on the scrap heap. The canal, however, is busy, being used for commercial shipping.
