

TO-DAY'S MESSAGES.

EARTH SHOCKS RECORDED IN VICTORIA.

VICTORIA, B.C., July 1.
Three very slight shocks were recorded in the last twenty-four hours up to nine o'clock this morning on the seismograph at the Gonzales Observatory here. The tremors appeared to be about the same distance from Victoria as the California earthquake. The first was at 11.0 a.m. yesterday, the second at 7.06 p.m. yesterday, and the third at 1.27 this morning.

ARE THEY DOWNHEADED?

SANTA BARBARA, Calif., July 1.
The city of Santa Barbara, yesterday the victim of one of the most disastrous earthquakes in Pacific coast history, tonight closed the biggest business day in its civic annals with the formulation of a programme of reconstruction that foreshadowed a great rejuvenated community. Facing an estimated loss of between \$20,000,000 and \$25,000,000 with possibly \$20,000,000 of earthquake insurance, the banking, business, industrial, and civic leaders launched a programme of immediate building, based on a \$20,000,000 loan and \$2,000,000 earthquake aid funds. Simultaneously the business and civic leaders accepted the offers of San Francisco and Los Angeles to send their best engineering talent here immediately to direct the demolition of the antiquated damaged buildings and to outline the plans of the new Santa Barbara.

FORD ENTERED A BID FOR SHIPPING BOARD FLEET.

DETROIT, July 1.
Henry Ford tonight told the Associated Press that he has entered a bid for the 200 ships of the Shipping Board fleet and that the bid is in the mails. "There was no misunderstanding of dates on my part," Mr. Ford said in denying that such was the cause for the failure of the Board to receive a bid from him when they were opened two days ago. "The bid was placed in the mails several days ago." Mr. Ford did not divulge the size of his bid, nor its specifications and attempts to obtain the information from members of his engineering and technical staff met with failure. Only one firm submitted a bid to the Shipping Board for the entire fleet of 200 ships, the Boston Iron and Metal Company, bidding \$1,370,000.

SINGAPORE BASE A MINOR ESTABLISHMENT.

LONDON, July 1.
"The Singapore naval base as contemplated by the British Government will be comparatively a very minor establishment, and there is no question of it being a great base for concentration," stated Earl Stanhope, the Civil Lord of the Admiralty, in the House of Lords to-day on behalf of the Government during a debate inaugurated by the Labor Party upon the projected naval establishment in the Far East. Those opposed to the project have asserted that the British naval programme caused much anxiety among other nations particularly Japan. The Earl of Balfour who followed Earl Stanhope on the floor ridiculed the Labor suggestion that a large number of other naval bases dependent upon the Singapore base would be required. He cited the Washington Naval Treaty as forbidding the construction of more naval bases.

FORMER HEAD OF BLIND SCHOOL CRITICALLY ILL.

HALIFAX, July 1.
Sir Frederick Fraser, for many years head of the Halifax School for the Blind and known throughout the Maritimes for his work among the sightless, was said to-night to be critically ill at his home here with little hope entertained for his recovery.
