

# Governor Opens Humber Plant

## Operations Officially Begun at Corner Brook --- 700 Guests Attend Ceremonies.

In glorious weather and in the presence of a large gathering of the invited guests, the official opening of the Paper Mills at Corner Brook, took place this morning. Sir Glynn West, His Excellency, Lady Allardice, and other distinguished guests, were present for their presence, and expressed the gratification of the commission in having established an industry worthy of the country. At 10 o'clock the Governor, in the presence of a large party, set out in motor car to Corner Brook, setting in motion a paper conveyor on which appeared a suitably decorated roll of paper followed by standard rolls of paper towards the wharf, thus officially opening the great 400 ton paper mill on which construction work was first started in May, 1923.

The big shed in which the opening ceremony took place was filled with guests, over 600 of whom were the guests of the Newfoundland Power & Paper Company, and included many distinguished visitors from abroad. Prominent amongst the guests were members of the British Empire Parliamentary delegation, Premier Chamberlain and Lieut. Governor Percival of Quebec. Sir Newton Moore, Sir Glynn West, Sir Henry Grey, and other representatives of the Newfoundland Legislature, the various manufacturing companies, and other persons in declining the Mills open, his Excellency referred to the happy coincidence of having present the Parliamentary Delegates from Great Britain which was a joint partner with Newfoundland in helping finance such great enterprises. Contrasting the record to many events in history and questioning whether any of greater importance or of greater possibilities had taken place.

Following the opening ceremonies a visit was paid by the guests to the station and mills, his Excellency being accompanied by Sir Glynn West, John Stadler, the General Manager of the N.P.P., and other officials. All were greatly interested in the intricate mechanism of the plant, which is one of the largest in the world and when working at its maximum capacity will produce 440 tons of newspaper per day.

At the luncheon to-day, held in one of the great wharf sheds, an interesting event was the presentation by Sir Glynn West of a specially engraved silver tea service to Mr. Christopher, the pleasure of Corner Brook. The presentation was made following a very graceful speech, amid much applause, by Sir Glynn West, who concluded the luncheon with a congratulatory address to the various sub-contractors, whose efficiency and interest in their work helped so much towards the early completion of the Mills. Addresses were also made by Mr. Alexander, who has been the local manager of the Armstrong, Whitworth Company since construction work began, and by John Stadler, the General Manager of the N.P.P., whose long experience in the papermaking industry is an assurance of the ultimate prosperity of the Humber development.

Lady Allardice Opens Hospital. Early this afternoon Lady Allardice opened the Company's hospital, which is a splendidly equipped building, being fitted with every necessary convenience. Following Lady Allardice's delightful address, Miss Keegan, the Superintendent of the Hospital, spoke of the hospital, afterwards addresses were made by two distinguished medical visitors, Sir Henry Grey, the well known surgeon, and Dr. Haden Guest, who is one of the Labour members of the Parliamentary delegation.

700 Guests Will Attend Dinner. At the dinner to be held in one of the mill sheds to-night, covers will be laid for more than 700 guests. Sir Glynn West will preside, and the following Toast List will be proceeded with:—

# Welcome to British M.P.'s

Among the guests who have assembled to-day at Corner Brook are the members of the Empire Parliamentary delegation. Following the functions connected with the opening of the paper mill, they will pay a visit to Grand Falls and then continue their journey to St. John's. On the occasion of their arrival the Telegram extends a hearty welcome to the visiting members of the British Parliament, and trusts that their stay in the island will be as pleasant to them as we feel certain it will be beneficial to ourselves.

The delegation consists of representatives of the various political parties in the House of Commons, and the following brief sketches will indicate who is who in the party:—

N. W. Smith-Carrington, Con. M.P. for Rutland and Stamford division, is a barrister at law, Inner Temple and Northern Circuit, a Director of the N.E. Power and Paper Co., Ltd., and a partner in the Ashby Fiverville Stud and Farm.

Captain Henry Douglas King, C.B. E., D.S.O., V.D., R.N.V.R., A.D.C. to the King, 1922, a Lord Commissioner to the Treasury since 1922, M.P. for South Paddington (Cons.) since 1922. Born in 1877, he spent several years in the Mercantile Marine, which he left in 1896 to take up farming. He afterwards studied law and in 1905 was called to the Bar of the Middle Temple, Sailor, farmer, barrister, Mr. King in 1909-10 contested the Northern District of Norfolk as Unionist candidate. In 1914 he was appointed to the Drake Battalion of the R.N. Division, and was present at the siege of Antwerp of that year. From April, 1915 to January, 1918 he was in Gallipoli during which time he was wounded and on three occasions mentioned in despatches and decorated with the D.S.O. Appointed to the command of the Drake Battalion, Capt. King served abroad and afterwards in Flanders with the R.N. Seige guns. There he won the Croix de Guerre and was specially promoted for distinguished services. From 1920 to 1922 he was Private Secretary to Sir Hamar Greenwood, Chief Secretary for Ireland.

J.P. W. Galbraith, K.C., M.P. (Con.) for East Surrey since 1922. A scholar of Oxford University (Oriel), Mr. Galbraith was called to the Bar in Lincoln's Inn. Becoming a member of the Council of the Bar, he was elected Hon. Treasurer in 1921. In 1923 he became Bench of Lincoln's Inn.

Reginald George Clarry, F.C.I.S., M.P. (Con.) for Newport Division since 1922. Born in Derby in 1882, R. G. Clarry was educated at Marlborough School, Stroud, and at the Technical College. Having worked with engineering firms in different parts of the country, he was appointed Resident Engineer at Shorefield, and became in turn Engineer Manager and Secretary to the Swansea Gas Co. and General Manager of the Duffryn Glass, During the war Mr. Clarry acted in an advisory capacity to the Ministry of Munitions, and took an active part in the chemical and high explosive department.

Dr. Leslie Hayden Guest, M.R.C.S., L.R.C.P., M.C., Major R.A.M.C., M.P. (Lab.) N. Southwick. The son of a Manchester physician and surgeon, Dr. Guest served as a surgeon in both the South African and the Great War, and in the latter saw service in Europe, Egypt and Palestine. Later he became physician to St. George's Dispensary and School Clinic, and organized hospitals under the French Red Cross in several places in
