Mr. Mackenzie at Lambton. Government Policy Indicated.

Hon. Alex. Mackenzie, Premier of the Dominnon, was elected by acolammation for Lambton on Tuesday. The nomination took place at Sarnia, and was followed by a banquet in the evening, at which over five hundred gentlemen were present. The utmost enthusiasm prevailed throughout the day. Mr. Mackenzie delivered an able speech, in the latter part of which he briefly sketched the probable policy of the Government. He said that, speaking in general terms, their policy would be to carry out in power what they advocated in opposition. One of their first measures would be an effective election law, and measures to preserve strictly the independence of the members of the Houses, the Senate as well as the House of Commons. Mr. Mackenzie spoke of the Pacific Railway. He was an advocate of such a road; its importance to the country had not been over rated. The new Administration would take early steps to that end. If we once have British Columbia and Manitoba made accessible the rest could be undertaken as soon as possible. The Government hoped to carry out the work at much less cost than Sir Hugh proposed; and it would appear that the Government is to let out the work in contracts under the work in contracts under their own superintendence, instead of delegating it to a company.
