

After four months' treatment, good nursing, and nutritiv diet, she left July 1, having gained 21 pounds, her cough apparently cured, and feeling strong enough to gather her children about her and undertake the burden of their support.

The second patient entered Feb. 28, and left June 25. He gained 18 pounds

and was pronounced by his doctor well nough to go to work.


