The position they took was that the revising officer should not have acted on the mandamus of the Queen's Bench, but should have stayed his hand, and then the Court of Appeal would have been forced to give a decision upon the right of the Queen's Bench to issue a mandamus. As regards upwards of 120 of the appealed voters, no evidence was given on their behalf before the revising officer; they declined to recognize the right of the revising officer to question their votes in view Judge Elliot's previous decision. He (Mr. H.) claimed that 40 or 50 of those who voted were qualified to exercise the franchise and were prepared to prove their right before the judge.
