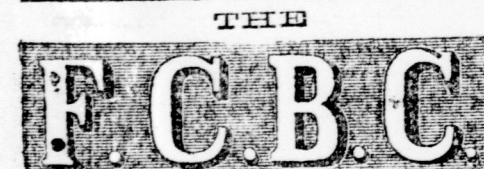

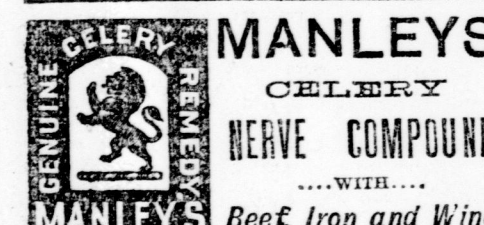

TORONTO, Oct. 3.—11 p.m.—The depres-
sion mentioned last night is slowly dis-
persing over the northern lake district. It
has caused some heavy rains and high
winds in the greater part of the lake dis-
trict, which condition is now going in
Quebec. It is fair in the Maritime Pro-
vinces and fair and cool in the Northwest.

BUFFALO, N. Y., Oct. 3.—The Delaware,
Lackawanna and Western Railway is suing
the New York, Susquehanna and Western
Railroad for \$4,355,000 for breach of an
exclusive contract, by the terms of which the
coal mined and shipped by the Susquehanna
should be exclusively carried into New
York by the Lackawanna. A great array of
lawyers appear in the case. Whether or
not this suit indicates a break in the coal
combine remains to be seen, but the dispute
between these two coal operators will last a
long time in the courts unless a compromise
is patched up.
