FAIR AND COOL

Toronto, Ont., Aug. 16—11 p.m.—The low area has moved slowly across Northern Ontario, and is now central between Montreal and Quebec, while higher pressure is spreading towards the lake region from the westward. In the Dining-Room.

WEDNESDAY, AUG. 18.

BREAKFAST—Granola, cream, Fried potatoes, Egg omelet, Coffee.

LUNCHEON—Cold veal and tongue sliced, Sliced tomatoes, Potato salad, Tea, hot or cold.

DINNER—Broiled steak with Bordelaise sauce, Sweet potatoes, baked with sugar and butter, Lima beans, Sliced cucumber, Snow pudding, Iced tea.

Cut out these recipes and paste them in a scrap-book.

Cold Veal Tongue.—Take two veal tongues and cook in boiling salted water until tender. Leave in the water until cold and then remove the skin from them and slice very thin. This makes a pretty dish garnished with celery leaves and hard-boiled eggs.

Broiled Steak, with Bordelaise Sauce.—Place the broiler over hot coals or over a hot plate. Sprinkle with salt and pepper. Broil on one side until done, place on the broiler, and when brown on one side turn the other. When done place on a hot platter and garnish with hot melted butter and sprinkle over it a salted portion of salt and one of pepper. The sauce is prepared as follows, and may be served as a separate dish or spread over the meat: Chop one large onion very fine and fry in a light brown in one tablespoonful of butter. Mash six large ripe tomatoes through a sieve and pour in with the onion. When it begins to boil stir in one clove of garlic, chopped fine, one tablespoonful of salt and two of pepper. Cook fifteen minutes.

Sweet Potatoes, Baked with Sugar and Butter.—Steam four medium-sized sweet potatoes until tender, or slice them while raw and cook in boiling water for 10 minutes. Drain from the water and place a layer in the bottom of a baking dish. Sprinkle with sugar and place little pieces of butter over them. Fill the dish in this way. Pour sugar and butter being on top. Four or five minutes before the potatoes are done, the water in which they were boiled and place in a hot oven for half an hour.

Snow Pudding.—Two tablespoonfuls of corn starch, and mix with a little cold water, pour on this one cup of boiling water, then cook until it looks like starch. Add two tablespoonfuls of sugar and the juice of one-half a lemon, also the whites of two eggs, beaten stiff, and beat all thoroughly together. Put in a dish and set away to cool.

Sauce.—Boil one-half pint of milk. Stir in it two ounces of sugar, a half-tablespoon of butter and the beaten yolks of two eggs. Boil up once and let it get cool.

—The charge against Mr. John Flynn, of St. Thomas, of being a dangerous lunatic was investigated at the St. Thomas police court Monday morning and was quickly disposed of, as the evidence of Drs. Lawrence and Van-Buskirk indicated clearly that Mr. Flynn was of an unsound mind and was dangerous to be at large. They were instructed by the court to make out the requisite papers and have him sent to the London Asylum.

—Suit was entered at Toronto yesterday by A. J. Tymon, J. D. Murphy and James McSherry, owners of the steamer A. J. Tymon, which recently replied between Cleveland, Rond Eau and Port Stanley, against Archibald Patterson, of Ridgeway, the lessee of the vessel, for \$2,000 damages for alleged breach of contract. In addition \$500 is claimed as being due the owners of the vessel, and \$245, as having been expended by them on behalf of the defendant.

—The many friends of Mrs. M. A. Lewis, widow of the late Edwin Lewis, formerly of this city, will hear with deep sorrow of her death, which took place at the residence of her daughter, Mrs. Jas. A. Lee, Grand Rapids, Mich., after a long illness. The deceased lady was a model of Christian patience, and bore her affliction for the past four years without a murmur. Five children survive her—three sons, Edward,

Harry and Charles, of Chicago, and two daughters, Mrs. Wm. Lucas, 519 Ontario street, London, and Mrs. Jas. A. Lee, of Grand Rapids.

—Five Englishmen were registered at the Leland Hotel on Monday on their way to the gold fields. On the hotel register they had written in bold handwriting: "We are off for Klondike."

The party consists of Harry C. Taylor, London; Fred. Hamilton, Plymouth; T. C. Quimby, Birmingham; George O. Fuller, Victoria, B. C., and W. H. Chambers, London, Ont. All are said to have good family connections and plenty of money. One of them, it is said, asked the clerk where he could have a draft for \$10,000 cashed. All were strangers to one another till they accidentally met in London, Ont., a few days previously. They decided to go to the gold fields on the spur of the moment. They left for Seattle the same night—Chicago British-American.

STREET CAR ON FIRE.

A Richmond street trolley car was on fire at the corner of Dundas and Richmond streets about 6:30 p.m. yesterday. The conductor noticed smoke curling up through the opening at the side of the car where the windows drop and ran to a store near by for a pail of water, with which he removed all cause for alarm. A passenger had dropped a lighted cigar butt between the outer wall and the lining of the car, and from this the fire started.
