The Boer Governments Make a Strong Appeal.

Urging Them to Join the Burghers in the Hour of Their Supreme Struggle-Boer Attack on Wepener Weakening -What Roberts Proposes to Do-Rain Delays the Movements of the Troops-Lord Roberts Criticises the Work of Gens. Warren and Buller.

Cape Town, April 17 .- The Boer Gov- 1 ernments are circulating the following manifesto to the Afrikanders throughout Cape Colony:

"We feel that our fate and the fate of the whole of Afrikanderdom is at stake, and we appeal to you to stand and fight shoulder to shoulder with us. You cannot, you may not allow the tyrant to extinguish forever your finest traits of character as a nation. With you on our side the issue cannot be doubtful. We must conquer. God grant that love for your country and your liberty, and the noble virtues of

us in the hour of our supreme struggle." DEAD AT WEPENER UNBURIED. Maseru, April 17.-Col. Dalgetty's casualties, since he has been besieged at Wepener have been 20 killed and 100 wounded. BOERS MAY BE CUT OFF. Maseru, April 18.-The Caledon is rising, which alarms the Boers, who are now on both sides of the river and might be cut off if the stream were to become flooded. THE CRITIC IMPATIENT.

London, Wednesday, April 18-4:15 a.m.—Lord Roberts' long wait and the Boer activity have seriously disturbed public equanimity. He is still 300 miles from Pretoria. No one doubts the ultimate success of British arms; but behind the army that crushes the Boer armies an army of occupation will have to be installed. From various sources come hints that more men than are already provided for will have to be sent out. Lord Roberts indicates that at least 10,000 men are advancing to cut off the Boers who

are investing Wepener. As there are reports from the Basuto border that firing has been heard in the direction of the hills toward Dewetsdorp, it is possible Gen, Chermside's advance troops are already in

contact with the Boers.

Lord Roberts wires that he expects to clear the southeastern sections of the Free State, east of the railway, and then to swing round to the north and to turn one after another the positions held by the Boers north of Bloemfontein. Gen. Buller's prohibition of all press telegrams in Natal until further notice is taken to indicate that a movement is to begin there. A dispatch to the Times from Johannesburg, dated Monday, says: "On Friday the Boers tried to rush Col. Dalgetty's left front, but retired after fighting an hour. Their attack is apparently weakening, although large numbers of fresh schanzes are vsiible along the enemy's position. Boer patrols have reappeared along the Orange River and at the drifts.

TENACIOUSLY HELD. London, April 17, 1:10 p.m.—The war office has received the following dispatch from Lord Roberts, dated Blo-

emfontein, Tuesday, April 17: "Our force at Wepener is still surrounded, but it is reported that the enemy are attacking in a very halfhearted manner, and are anxious about their communications, hearing that forces are approaching Wepener from two directions-one under Gen. Rundle, via Reddersburg, and another under Gen. Brabant, with Gen. Hart's brigade in support, via Rouxville. "On the reoccupation of Rouxville, April 15, the Boers there retired, and Gen. Brabant made some impor-

tant arrests. "Violent storms of rain have somewhat interfered with the march of these columns, but it is hoped they will soon be able to make their presence more decidedly felt.

"Gen. Settle reports from Kenhardt,

April 14, that 200 Transvaalers made a determined attack the previous day on Dopaspoort, held by a party of Orpen's Horse. Our losses were two killed and one wounded. The enemy's losses must have been heavy, as they applied to us for doctors and an ambulance.
