MORE PROPOSALS. Washington, D. C., Oct. 4.-Propositions of a far-reaching character concerning China are being presented in rapid succession to this government. The state department had no sooner disposed of one of these propositions today by delivering a response to the German Government than it was confronted by an even more important proposition submitted by the French Government, and within half an hour formally seconded by the Russian

Government. The answer to Germany covered the subject of punishing Chinese offenders, and made known that the United States had instructed Minister Conger along the lines suggested by Germany. Those instructions look towards securing the names of persons deserving punishment, also whether the punishments accord with the gravity of the crimes committed, and finally, in what manner the United States and the other powers are to be assured that satisfactory

punishment, is inflicted. The Franco-Russian proposal takes a much broader scope, and submits a programme under which the negotiations for a complete settlement can be carried forward. The French charge, M. Thiebaut, handed the proposition to Secretary Hay today, and held a brief conference concerning it. Half an hour later M. De Woollant, the Russian charge, arrived at the state department and handed to Mr. Hay a note expressing Russian approval the propositions just submitted by France. Mr. Hay gave no formal answer to the two communications, as they will go first to the president at

Canton. THE FRANCO-RUSSIAN SCHEME. The Franco-Russian proposition is under four heads: First, punishment of the guilty parties; second, interdiction of the shipment of arms into China; third, permanent indemnity to the powers, and, fourth, sufficient guarantees for the future. In addition, a suggestion is made for the establishment of a permanent legation guard at Pekin, for the razing of the Taku forts, and for the maintenance of a line of communication between Pekin and

Hazleton, Pa., Oct. 5.-Eight Italians employed on the night shift of the Calvin Pardee & Co.'s colliery at Lattimer, were attacked on the public road leading from that place to Hollywood early this morning by 25 women, who had marched from Minersville. The women were mostly Hungarians and Italians. A few of the women were armed with clubs, but most of them carried stones of various sizes in their aprons. The workmen did not attempt to defend themselves, but ran away and were soon out of the reach of the fury of the excited women.
