courage met the splendid assault of the British naval brigade at Gras Pan. ADDITIONAL CASUALTIES. London, Nov. 28.-The commanderin-chief at the Cape has sent the admiralty an additional list of casualties among the British naval brigade engaged at the battle of Gras Pan,

as follows: Midshipman Huddart, of the cruiser Doris, and ten sailors and marines killed, and thirteen petty officers and seamen and 76 non-commissioned officers and men of the marines wounded. Total casualties 105, including the names of those already cabled.

THE QUEEN'S MESSAGE. The following message has been telegraphed to the commander-in-chief at

the Cape: "The Queen desires you to convey to the naval brigade, who were present at the action of Gras Pan, her majesty's congratulations on their gallant conduct, and at the same time express the Queen's regret at the losses sus-

tained by the brigade." IN CAPE COLONY.

London, Nov. 27.-The outlook in Cape Colony does not appear so bright as the situation in Natal. That Gen. Gatacre has no easy task is proved by the latest dispatches from Queenstown and elsewhere, showing that the majority of the population on the frontier have openly declared themselves on the side of the Boers. Bands of Boers are doing immense damage over a wide area, and they are now south of Stormberg. Gen. Gatacre, however, moves to the front today, so it is hoped by the British the invasion will soon be stemmed. REBELLION

Cape Town, Nov. 27.—A meeting of refugees from Aliwal North, the constituency of Mr. J. W. Sauer, the commissioner of public works, held at Queenstown on Sunday, passed a resolution of "distrust and alarm" at Mr. Sauer's visit to the border, "which has been followed by such an outbreak of treason and rebellion." The resolution was sent to Sir Alfred Milner, and says "the refugees do not grudge any sacrifices, providing British supremacy is re-established."

BOERS AT STEYNBURG. London, Dec. 28.-According to a dispatch from De Aar, dated Sunday, the Boers had destroyed the bridge at Steynburg the previous day, and were being reinforced at that point. PRAISE FOR THE GUARDS.

At Wellington Barracks, the following telegram, undated, was posted, from Col. Dispatches From Gen. Buller Giving the British Casualties.

Gen. Methuen's Victory Won at a Cost of 193 Men Either Killed, Wounded or Missing-The Lancers Are All

London, Nov. 28.-A dispatch has been received here from Gen. Bullen giving a list of the casualties among the troops engaged in what has been known here as the battle of Gras Pan but which is now officially designated the battle of Enslin. It proves that the British success was heavily bought, The losses announced today, added to the naval brigade casualties, previously noted, make a grand total of 198 as the cost of Gen. Methuen's second

YORKSHIRES LOST HEAVILY. The Yorkshires bore with the naval

brigade the brunt of the fighting, as there were, in addition to three officers, 48 of the rank and file killed, wounded and missing. The fact that the list contains the casualties of the Ninth Lancers, seems to dispose of the fears that the cavalry was surrounded and captured, especially as none of the lancers are reported missing.
