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The Boers Are Falling Back

Enemy's Invasion of Natal Has Spent Its Force.

British Troops Are Pressing Forward. Gen. Clery Advancing to the Relief of Ladysmith.

Anxiety Felt for the Safety of the Ninth Lancers. Gen. Methuen Is the Hero of the Hour.

Won the First Battle Which Has Not Been Followed by a British Retreat. The Queen's Message Regarding the Bravery and the Losses of the Naval Brigade.

WHERE ARE THE LANCERS? The Daily Mail says that a private telegram announces that the Lancers are still scouting ahead of Lord Methuen's advancing column.

IN CAPE COLONY. London, Nov. 27.—The outlook in Cape Colony does not appear so bright as the situation in Natal.

REBELLION. Cape Town, Nov. 27.—A meeting of refugees from Alvala North, the constituency of Mr. J. W. Sauer, the commissioner of public works, held at Queenstown on Sunday, passed a resolution of "disturb and alarm" at Mr. Sauer's visit to the border.

BOERS AT STEYNBURG. London, Dec. 25.—According to a dispatch from De Aar, dated Sunday, the Boers had destroyed the bridge at Steynburg the previous day, and were being reinforced at that point.

PRaise For The Guards. At Wellington Barracks, the following telegram, undated, was posted, from Col. Crabbie, of the Grenadier Guards, respecting the fight at Belmont: "The Grenadiers, on the right, and the Scots Guards, on the left, successfully carried a height east of Belmont. The battalion fully maintained the reputation of the regiment. The casualty list shows that in addition to Lieut. Fryer killed and Col. Crabbie and six other officers wounded, 21 men were killed and 88 wounded, with 5 unaccounted for."

JOUBERT'S GREAT FAITH. Pretoria, Nov. 28.—Gen. Joubert, writing to a friend in Madgeburg, says: "It is no vanity on my part to assert that we will triumph. We prepared secretly for the war. We knew it was inevitable. The war will perhaps last a year, but I am convinced that the blood spilled will never be upon our children."

LIPTON'S GREAT GIFT. Sir Thomas Lipton, in view of the fact that his steam yacht 'Erie' cannot be utilized by the admiralty as a hospital ship, has sent \$50,000 to the Princess of Wales to be used at her discretion for the benefit of the soldiers and the sailors. The executive committee of the American hospital ship fund has received an anonymous gift of \$25,000 from the United States, together with a promise of as much more if it should be needed.

THE LOSSES AT GRAS PAN

Dispatches From Gen. Buller Giving the British Casualties. Gen. Methuen's Victory Won at a Cost of 193 Men Either Killed, Wounded or Missing—The Lancers Are All Right.

London, Nov. 28.—A dispatch has been received here from Gen. Buller giving a list of the casualties among the troops engaged in what has been known here as the battle of Gras Pan but which is now officially designated the battle of Enslin. It proves that the British success was heavily bought. The losses announced today, added to the naval brigade casualties, previously noted, make a grand total of 193 as the cost of Gen. Methuen's second battle.

YORKSHIRES LOST HEAVILY. The Yorkshires bore with the naval brigade the brunt of the fighting, as there were, in addition to three officers, 48 of the rank and file killed, wounded and missing. The fact that the list contains the casualties of the Ninth Lancers, seems to dispose of the fears that the cavalry was surrounded and captured, especially as none of the lancers are reported missing.

Apparently the government is monopolizing the single cable working to South Africa, as up to 2 o'clock this afternoon no news from the seat of war had been made public, with the exception of Gen. Buller's dispatches. This is particularly tantalizing at the present critical moment. While the latest news is of a fairly reassuring character from the British viewpoint, much of it is assumed to be true on insufficient evidence.
