It is proposed that it shall be the greatest institution of its kind in the world. The tender was made to President Harper through M. Lebaudy's agent, Emile Ridel, of the French army. Dr. Harper promptly replied it was the

very thing the university desired, and the preliminaries were settled at once. The new school is to be an integral part of the University of Chicago, and the necessary buildings, for which M. Labaudy will furnish the money, will be located on the campus of that institution. M. Lebaudy, it is said, will also establish an endowment fund. The students will consist of 600 graduates of French colleges, to be selected by the government, and 200 will be sent over each year. They will come on scholarships, all expenses of transportation and living being defrayed by
