IMPROVEMENT IN PITCHING

Great Advancement Made by Twirlers During the Last Three or Four Years.

The elements of success in the art of pitching are more numerous than the average beginner realizes, and it is only necessary for one to closely scrutinize the achievements of the men who are now acknowledged as the stars of the game, in this department, to discover that this is true. There has been such progress shown by the pitchers during the three decades of professional baseball as has been the case during the past three or four years, and this may be discerned if one will carefully compare the records of pitching feats. The pitchers are the more and more realizing the power they have where the strategic play is utilized, such as change of pace, thus serving to effectively disguise their intentions.

"Headwork" pitchers are the ones who advance through their powers of observation and native intelligence, and even though they have not as thorough a command of the ball as some of their competitors, achieve more of value to their club team. No matter how much skill and dexterity they may possess in their performance at the slab, without these are intelligently directed their work does not have a telling effect commensurate with what would otherwise be the case.

A twirler may have a sweeping curve that he may send in either direction he may elect, or a drop of the most deceptive character, yet if these offerings are indiscriminately used and presented with a sort of hit-and-miss, trust-to-luck style, little good either will do. It is the same with the pitcher who has a surplus of speed. He may use it at will, but outside of its intimidating effect little will accrue, for bases on balls, passed balls and wild pitches creep in and the damage is great.

As remarked at the beginning the elements of success in the art of pitching are greater than you might suppose, but they will quickly come to a realization of them through study and observation. No other possible method will reveal this to the beginner.

The exact and true foundation must be without this command of the ball, for without this is included in a pitcher's repertoire he cannot expect to excel in his chosen calling. With this important point in mind, the pitcher must give attention to other supreme features connected with his work.

Among these is the ever-present necessity of studying the strong as well as the weak points of each batsman who faces him. The pitcher must be fortified with peculiar powers of observation, and an intuitive judgment of every batsman that shall remain as a legacy to be called into use each time he confronts him as a batsman, is the one who will have all others who are less favorably equipped, and their work will suffer greatly by comparison. Realizing this fact the young pitcher should do everything possible to contribute to his effectiveness, and not follow the course so many do in their early practice days.

COURT FINISHED ALL ITS BUSINESS

The Case of Street Warehouse Company vs. Vandellinder Falls Through.

All the business of the non-jury sitting of the high court was concluded yesterday afternoon except the judgment in the case of Moffat vs. Leonard. The suit of Hayman vs. Builders' Supply Company, which has been hanging fire for some time, was finally disposed of today. Counsel, on behalf of plaintiff, claimed that the defendants were making a fraudulent attempt to exclude plaintiff from their company. Mr. Luscombe, for the defendants, stated that the object of the defendants was merely to sell their brickyard, and apply the proceeds towards paying off their liabilities. They were not trying to oust the plaintiff.

After counsel had addressed the court, his lordship suggested that the winding up of the company might solve the difficulty, as the sale might then be proceeded with. The case was then adjourned to allow the parties to attempt some agreement along these lines. After a time, an understanding was reached. It was stated that the costs of court would be paid out of the proceeds of the sale of the brickyard. The company was not to be wound up, however, and the plaintiff obtained the desired injunction perpetually restraining the defendants from selling out the total assets of the company. Plaintiff was satisfied, however, for the selling of the brickyard, as above.

The case of the Fore Street Warehouse Company of England vs. Vandellinder was next proceeded with. Plaintiff, as before stated, were acting on behalf of the creditors of the late firm of Clarke & Vandellinder, the claim being that the defendant diverted about \$50,000 from the assets of the firm when it was insolvent, thus robbing the plaintiff. Mr. Vandellinder, having left the country, did not appear as defendant. Mr. Wm. Hunter, who was charged with defending the claim, said money into his business, appeared as defendant. His lordship considered that the plaintiffs had not substantiated their claim, and judgment was given for the defendants with costs.

In addition to the two alimony cases, which it was announced yesterday were settled out of court, the case of Ashplant vs. Michaud was settled without further litigation. Plaintiff, who is a commercial traveler, had claimed that a balance of salary was due him, according to contract, from defendant. Defendant agreed to pay a certain sum in satisfaction of the claim.

The important breach of patent case, Way and Elliott vs. Falls and the Hygienic Pileed Undergarment Company, of Philadelphia, was postponed until the non-jury sittings next June. The plaintiff.
