### PERSIAN COLONY SEEKING CANADA

Nestorian Christians to Locate  
Near Battleford—More  
Coming.

Winnipeg, Man., Feb. 22.—Among the interesting bodies of settlers who are now on their way to the west are a number of Nestorian Christians from northern Persia. These colonists are being brought to Canada by Dr. Isaac Adams, who is himself a Nestorian Christian, who has been interested in the Canadian Northwest for a number of years.

In accordance with this plan Dr. Adams brought to the Dominion his first party several years ago. The people who followed him at that time established themselves in the district in the neighborhood of North Battleford, where they secured homesteads and have since lived cultivating the land and raising cattle. Their success has been sufficient to induce Dr. Adams to make the trip to the old land for the purpose of bringing out a second party, the persons to arrive this spring being for the most part friends and relatives of those already members of the colony. It is said that there are at the present time in the colony 125 people and in the party which is to arrive from Persia this spring are 38 in addition.

It would seem probable that the colonists will be joined at some time in the future by an additional body from the United States. Some time ago the commissioner of immigration in the city received a communication

from one of the secretaries of the Presbyterian board of foreign missions in the United States stating that there were a number of Nestorians living in the cities of New York and Chicago, that these people had been accustomed to farming in their own country, that it would be a most unfortunate thing if they were to become permanent residents of large cities and asking whether it was possible that some location could be found where they might have the opportunity of going on the land. The communication from the secretary of the Presbyterian board was as follows:

Recently I have been gathering for Bible study the natives of Urmland, Kurdistan, and Persia, who have settled in Chicago. I understand there are about 350 here and about the same number in New York city. They speak the modern Syrian language. Most of them were farmers in their own land, and one of them who seems to be somewhat of a leader among them asked me to see whether some arrangement could be made for them to colonize in an agricultural region. They appear to be a strong, energetic and ambitious race, desirable for building up the unsettled portion of the country. Most of them have been under the influence of missionaries in Persia, although many of them retain the original modes of worship, and church connection, being Nestorian Christians. They expect many of their fellow countrymen to follow them to the United States.

The officials of the department of immigration replied to the communication stating that there was land available for settlers who came to the country, that it was not the policy of the government to establish colonies, but that all those coming in to the country had the privilege of selecting their land wherever it suited them. It is probable that of the Nestorians living in the cities of Chi-

cago and New York, a small portion will remove to Canada and will take up land somewhere in the neighborhood of the present existing colony of Nestorians.

### TORONTO POWER FIGURES

Hydro-Electric Commission Submits  
Figures for Niagara Falls Inquiry.

Toronto, Feb. 22.—The hydro-electric power commission submitted figures to the city today of the cost of power delivered to the consumer in Toronto. This takes into account the cost of distribution by the city as well as the commission's charge for the power.

The rates, according to meter, vary from \$45 per horsepower per annum for a ten-hour day, if only one horsepower is used, to \$18 per horsepower per annum if 200-horsepower is used.

At that the rates are less than half those charged by the Toronto Electric Light Company, which run from \$31 to nearly \$200.

A comparison is as follows:

The commissioner of industries will at once start to canvass for customers. The following are the figures, prices being given from 1-horsepower used 1 hour a day for a year of 300 days, to 200-horsepower and 10 hours a day. In the latter case the cost is only \$18 a horsepower.

One-horsepower used one hour daily for 300 days, one year, costs \$15 30; two hours a day, \$18 60; three hours, \$21 90; four hours, \$25 20; five hours, \$28 50; six hours, \$31 80; seven hours, \$35 10; eight hours, \$38 40; nine hours, \$41 70; ten hours, \$45 00.

For 2-horsepower—One hour daily for 300 days, \$15 a horsepower; two hours, \$18; three hours, \$21; four hours, \$24; five hours, \$27; six hours, \$30; seven hours, \$33; eight hours, \$36; nine hours, \$39; ten hours, \$42.

For 10-horsepower—One hour a day, \$14 20; two hours, \$16 20; three hours, \$18 20; four hours, \$20 20; five hours, \$22 20; six hours, \$24 20; seven hours, \$26 20; eight hours, \$28 20; nine hours, \$30 20; ten hours, \$32 20.

For 15-horsepower—One hour daily, \$13 50 per horsepower; two hours, \$15 50; five hours, \$21; eight hours, \$26 40; ten hours, \$30.

For 25-horsepower—One hour daily, \$12 35; five hours, \$18 75; eight hours, \$22 80; ten hours, \$25 50.

For 50-horsepower the charge is \$17 25 for five hours daily, \$20 40 for eight hours and \$22 50 for ten hours daily per horsepower.

If 100-horsepower is taken the cost for five hours daily for a year is \$15 75 per horsepower; eight hours, \$18, and ten hours \$19 50.

For 200-horsepower consumed, the cost for five hours daily is \$15; for ten hours, \$18 per horsepower per year.

"Hip! Hip! Hurrah!" is a modern phrase. The "Hip!" and the "Hurrah!" do not seem to have come together before the nineteenth century. In the eighteenth century, "Hip!" amounted to just "Hi!" or "Hullo!" while "Hurrah!" was then usually "Huzza!" It is like the Cossack shout "Ora!" but it is supposed to have been a German cry of the chase adapted by the German soldiers to war, and borrowed from them by the English, perhaps first of all at the time of the 30 years' war. "Hurrah!" is said to have been the battlecry of the Prussians in the war of liberation (1813-1814). Still, the curious fact that seventeenth and eighteenth century writers call "Huzza!" a sailors' shout, lends support to the conjecture that it may really have been the hoisting cry, "Hissa!"
