CANADIANS HOLD MILES OF TRENCH

General Alderson Writes To General Hughes In Praise of Troops.

GOOD WORK OF BATTERY

Demolishes Observation Post of Enemy-Casualties So Far 170.

[Special to The Advertiser.]

OTTAWA, March 31.-That Canadians

have been successfully holding more than three miles of trenches in the tine of the Allies' was stated in a letter from General Alderson, commanding the Canadian Expeditionary Division, which Minister of Militia Gen-Division, which Minister of Militia General Sam Hughes received today.

The letter was written on March 10.

We have been holding some 6.500 to 7,000 yards of trenches since the first of March, and I can safely say that all arms have settled into their work very well. I knew they would do well, but they have really done better than I expected. We have not, up to the present, been attacked, but we have been considerably shelled at times, and the casualties up to date are 6 officers and 164 of other ranks." Of the condition of the Canadians, General Alderson writes: "The health of the division writes: "The health of the division is good; the men seem cheerful and average of their intelligence will soon make itself felt."

Good Work by Generals.

General Alderson speaks with approval of the good work being done by Brigadier-Generals Mercer, Turner, Burstall and Currie.

"The co-operation between the field artillery and the infantry has been good," he writes. "And our heavy battery has succeeded in demolishing a tower used by the Germans as an observation post. Our gunners are naturally very pleased." In conclusion he wrote: "I think there is no doubt that the experience on Salisbury Plain disagreeable as it was, has really been a fine preparation for the work out here. 

Their pay has been reduced from four pence a day to two pence, and their rations from five loaves to two loaves.
