



REVIEW OF FORTNIGHT

LONDON, Nov. 1.- In a further review of the operations on the British front in France and Belgium, dated today, Gen. Sir Douglas Haig, the British ommander, reports:

"Since my last review, October 19, the weather has been mostly unfavorable to extended operations; the heavy rain almost daily has converted the chalk soil of the upland between the ness of mud. Such conditions hamper military operations very seriously, but nevertheless, during the last fortnight ve have made progress and advanced front towards Butte-de-Warlencourt, in the neighborhood of Gueude-court and Les Boeufs.


