During May It Will Sell At \$2.25 Per Hundred Pounds.

MEANS RETAIL REDUCTION

Price of Milk to Consumers, Starting Wednesday, Will Be 12 Cents a Quart.

The executive committee of the Mid-dlesex Milk Producers' Association which met on Monday afternoon, decided to reduce the price of milk from \$2.45 to \$2.25 per 100 pounds for the month of May. The meeting was at-tended by representatives of the distributors. Prices to the consumer wil also be reduced one cent a quart, start-

ing Wednesday.

E. Stonehouse, president of the Dairy Council of Canada, was present, and in an address told of the conditions in the dairy industry at the present time. Mr. Stonehouse gave a brief outline of the success of the "drink more milk" campaign, which was recently held in

#### Seed Blown From Ground By Western Windstorm

Regina, Sask., May 3.-From Assiniboia to Saskatoon and from Swift Current to Regina, Saskatchewan, was yesterday visited with one of the most violent windstorms of years. The fifty-mile-an-hour gale commenced early in the morning, and practically stopped all seeding in the province and did not subside until night. Agriculture experts express the fear that where soil is light and well worked seed would be blown out of the ground.

Serious damage to summer fallow was caused by the storm in Assiniboia district. Seeding has been about 50 per cent completed in that district and the full extent of the damage will not be known until the soil settles. In the Regina district but little damage is expected because of the moisture in the soil. In Regina, several fences, chimneys and many signs were blown down.

The storm reached violent proportions in Moose Jav; and construction work was suspended for the day. Much of the seeding will have to be done over again in this district.

Mother of Man Condemned To Die On June 2 Secures 1.500 Signatures to Petition Circulated in Woodstock and Oxford County-Prisoner Spends Time Smoking and Reading-Visited Daily by Wife.

Woodstock, May 3.—The mother of Norman Garfield has returned to her home in Toronto, following a three weeks canvass of the people of Woodstock and Oxford County, securing signatures to a petition praying that the sentence of death imposed on her son for the murder of Ben Johnson nere on January 20, be commuted to life imprisonment. That the Toronto woman has been quite successful in the murder of the death that she secured over prisonment. That the Toronto woman has been quite successful in her mission may be gleaned from the fact that she secured over 1.500 signatures to her petition. In her canvass Mrs. Garfield endeavored to secure a list representative of business, professional and prominent citizens, and in this she has been quite successful. Mrs. Garfield traveled much through the county, and was assisted by the spiritual adviser of the condemned man. In her travels she encountered the majority of the jurymen who brought in the verdict of guilty against her son. That her mission bore fruit is strongly emphasized from the fact that nine out of the twelve jurymen signed the petition. Just what reasons they gave for signing the petition the petition. Just what reasons they gave for signing the petition are not known, but this will likely be brought out at the proper time. In the meantime Garfield, whose date of execution is set for June 2, is giving no trouble at the jail. He has no visitors excepting his wife, who visits him for an hour twice daily, and his spiritral adviser who has only missed two days since Garfield has been contined. Garfield is a great reader, and with the solace of his pipe, spends most of his time reading books, papers and magazines.
