SLAIN PASTOR'S WIDOW DENIES WOMAN'S STORY

Mrs. Frances Stevens Hall Interrogated by Army of Reporters.

SHEDS BUT LITTLE LIGHT

New Brunswick, N. J., Woman Breaks Silence Maintained For Seven Weeks.

NEW BRUNSWICK, N. J., Nov. 1.—“What comment could I make? Of course, that was not so, and that is all.”

With these words, Mrs. Frances Stevens Hall opened today her first interview, an interview planned by her counsel in connection with the Hall-Mills murder mystery.

For the first time since she was widowed by the slaying of the Rev. Edward Wheeler Hall and his choir leader, Mrs. Eleanor Reinhardt Mills, Mrs. Hall has emerged from the seclusion she has maintained for seven weeks, meeting a small army of newspaper writers in her home, and subjecting herself to an hour's bombardment of questions.

At the end she retired as she had entered the room, wan but composed. She had shed no light on the mystery. Hers was a negative story. It amplified but did not materially alter the statements previously made on her behalf by counsel and friends.

Repeats Statements. Briefly, it was that Dr. Hall had started out to his doom, saying he was going on an errand of mercy to discuss with Mrs. Mills a hospital bill which he was paying with church funds; that he was slain by a person, and for a motive of which she had not the slightest conjecture; and that her memory of him is unimpaired by the scandal in which his name has been involved.

“Have you any comment to make, Mrs. Hall,” the spokesman began, “on that part of Mrs. Gibson's story (Mrs. Jane Gibson, the so-called eyewitness of the slaying), in which she says you were present on the Phillips farm on the night of Sept. 14?” Mrs. Hall replied: “What comment could I make? Of course, that was not so, and that is all.”

“You were not there?”

Refuses to Answer. For an hour then one reporter after another volleyed questions at her. Three or four times she took refuge behind the reply, “I cannot remember,” and on three questions she refused point blank to answer. But throughout the interview she maintained that she always had believed and still believed in the faithfulness of her husband to his marriage vows.

The three questions Mrs. Hall refused to answer were:

First, a request for her estimate of the character of the woman slain with her husband.

Second, whether or not she believed in divorce, and would have sought a divorce if she had known of intimacy between Mr. Hall and Mrs. Mills.

And, third, where Mr. Hall got half of the \$20,000 in securities found in his safety deposit vault, and with which he was reported to have planned an elopement to the Orient with Mrs. Mills.

Her lawyer later explained that she refused to discuss the origin of the funds because she herself had given them to him, and she felt delicate in going into a personal matter.

SPECIAL OFFICERS CALLED TO COURT

McLaughlin, G. A. Wright, W. E. Partridge and J. P. Parish.

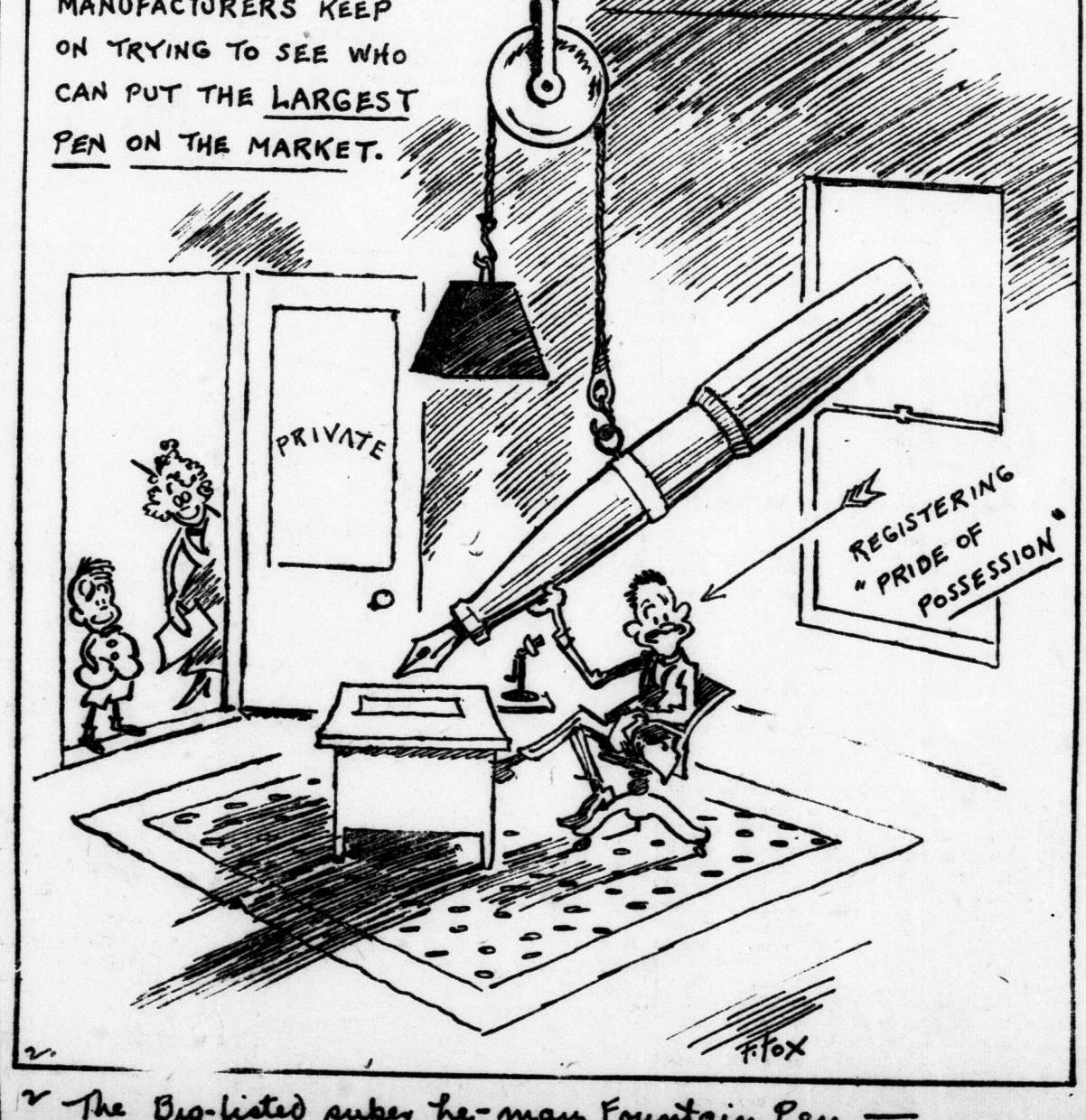

This being refused to them they threatened the caretaker, it is said, with a gun and were only expelled when assistance arrived from No. 10 police station.

FINDS BODY OF MAN WHO TOOK OWN LIFE

SUDBURY, Nov. 1.—What appears to have been a deliberate case of suicide about 18 months ago has come to light when a farmer named Hampton discovered the skeleton of a man in the bush near Long Lake. The provincial police believe it is the body of John Tutin, a widower, who previously lived at Copper Cliff. Tutin at the time was despondent and had come out from Copper Cliff to the Long Lake section looking for work. He had only 80 cents to his name at the time. The 80 cents was found in one of the pockets of his clothing. The skeleton was found with the head suspended from a small poplar tree by a shoestring. The body was prone on the ground, indicating that

Tutin had lain down and committed his rash act by slow strangulation.
