

"CANADA FIRST" URGED BY KELLY

President of Advertising Agency in Hamilton Speaks to Kiwanians.

VITAL POINTS

Russell Kelly, president of a Hamilton advertising agency, speaking to the London Kiwanis club today in the Tecumseh house, urged on the members the claims of Canada as a prosperous country and of the benefits which would ensue in the dominion from determined co-operative effort.

He gave certain things as being vital in the regeneration of business in Canada. They were the immigration in the children of the history of the dominion, the explanation to young men that there were many Canadians who had stayed at home and succeeded, and that there was no real advantage in crossing the international line to seek and attain business success. That Canadian coal should be used more than it is by Canadians, and that Nova Scotia coal in particular should be shipped into Quebec and Ontario. That a tax should be placed on all goods exported from the country. That there should be a "Buy in Canada" drive put into actual practice, and that further and more friendly co-operation between the farmer and the city man would be beneficial to the country at large.

Pulpwood Embargo.
On the question of a pulpwood embargo, one of the most important questions the country is now facing, he said, Mr. Kelly quoted a man from Northern Ontario who had been in the business of lumber for 25 years as follows:

"What the country needs is not an embargo on pulpwood but a tax on all pulpwood exported. The embargo would prevent many small farmers in the pulpwood country from getting their farms cleared and a profit from the land. If there were a tax of \$5 on pulpwood from all government lands and a tax of \$1 on all wood from private lands, and this was put aside as a fund for the export of national lumber interests and resources, it would be the best move ever undertaken, from a Canadian standpoint."

Use Nova Scotia Coal.
He was plain-spoken as to the situation in Nova Scotia, and as to the need of using the maritime coal in this province if the harmony of the country was to be preserved.

"Down there," he said, "there is too often a feeling that Canada ends at Montreal or Quebec. If we could take their coal and use it to supplement the fuel which we get each year from the states and for which we pay every twelve months \$3,000,000, it would go a long way towards alleviating the unrest and very unpleasant feeling which today exists in the maritime provinces of the Dominion."

Mr. Kelly said that the London Kiwanis club was arranging to send speakers to the various schools to explain the history and natural resource strength of the Dominion to the school children.

It was also a Thespian day at the club. Gerald Griffin, who is singing at the grand opera in Hamilton, was the star of the week, was a guest of the club and sang several of his favorites as well as amusing the members with a few of his imitations of the globe in the course of his travels.

Frank Routledge of the Toronto Kiwanis, who has just returned from a business visit to the states, told the club that everywhere since the presidential election there was a prevailing feeling of commercial optimism and prophetic of the future which would cross the line before spring, and have a similar beneficial effect in the Dominion.

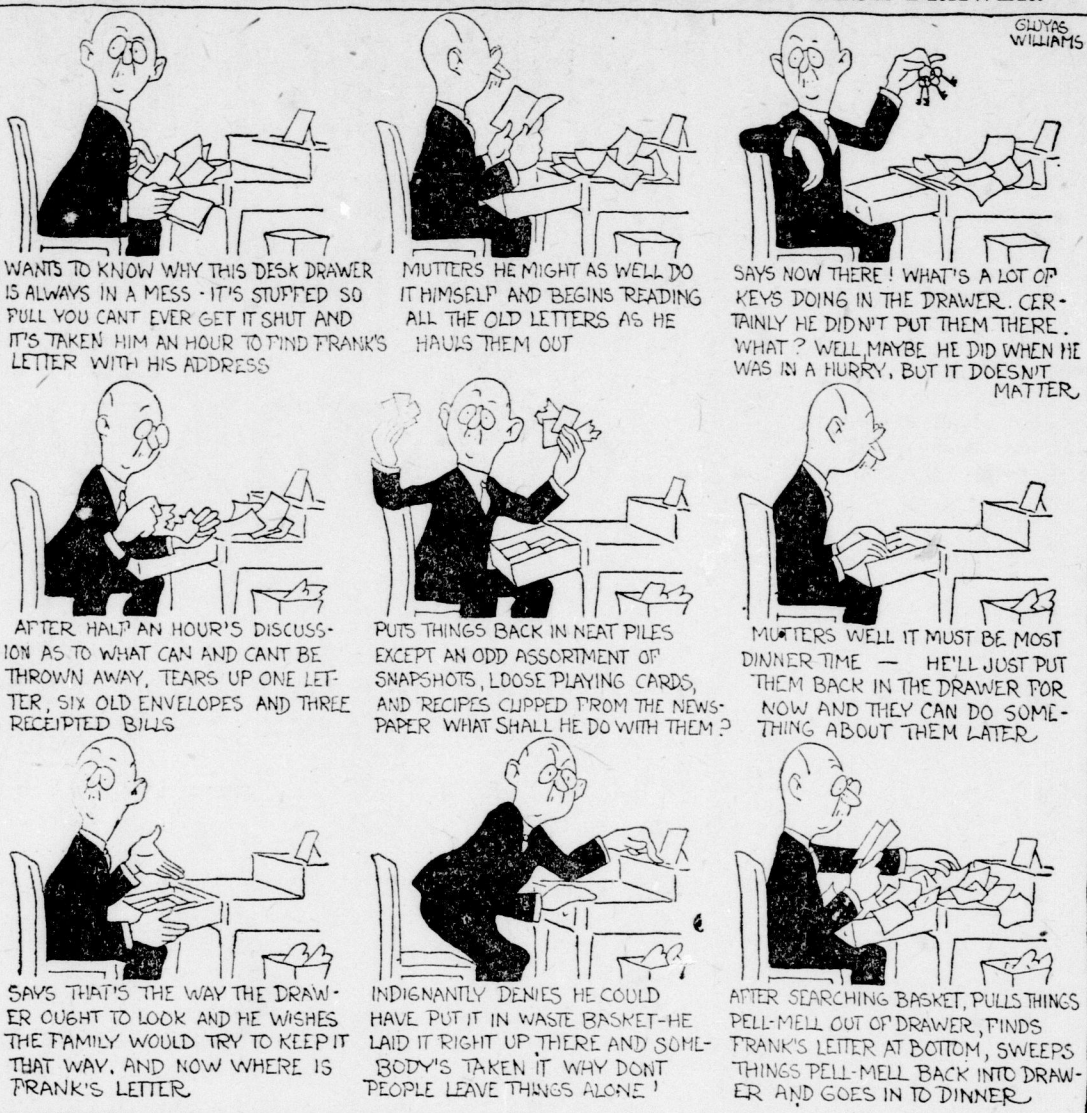
**FARMERS FEAR BIG HILL
