New York, Dec. 28.—Mrs. Julia Heath, national president of the Housewives' League has taken up the scheme of "bringing down prices" for sale and the housekeeper in the city who wants to buy the freshest and best by substituting for the middle man Uncle Sam's parcels post will go into operation next Wednesday.

"The plan is very simple," Mrs. Heath said to-day. "We are establishing a parcel post registry which will act as a clearing house between the producer and the consumer. The participation will cost producer and consumer \$1. In this way you see, they will be brought in touch with each other. Similar registries are to be established in other cities."

Mrs. Heath, who is now trying to stir up the apple market with the idea in view of bringing the fruit out of storage in sufficient quantities to meet the demand and also to reduce the price, said to-day that she had received many letters from the shippers who are willing to supply the leagues with Baldwin, Spitzenberg and Winesaps in any quantities at from \$1.75 to \$4.50 a barrel.

The league, however, does not want to go into the market as a seller of apples unless it is obliged to do so.
