The Sorrows Of Empire

Americans Unable to Take Up Spanish Control Over Philippines.

Native Allies of Spain Now Face ing Butchery by In. surgents.

Minnesota Scouts Run Out of Ammunition in Brush Enemy.

Manila, April 20.-(6:30 p. m) Spain's evacuation of the Philippine slands will be practically completed by the withdrawal of the Spanish garrison from Zamboanga, island of Mindanao, and from the Sulu islands, and if the United States assumes control of Mindanao and the Sulu islands on the Span ards withdrawing, the military author ties here must, in order to garrison these slands, diminish the forces of American troops, which are already too small. There was almost mutiny among the Spanish troops in the islands because they were ordered to proceed to the Mariana or Ladrone islands and the

Caroline islands, some of them refusing to do so, claiming that their enlistments had expired. The latter were exempted and were allowed to return to Spain on board the transport Alava. The native troops in the Spanish garrison are in a sad plight. They must accompany the Spaniards or risk the rengeance of their compatriots. The Spaniards propose to disband them, but they refuse to give up their arms.

The natives of Zamboanga, embolden
