Unfortunate Englishman. — Adv from the north received yesterday v to the effect that the mysterious dipearance of Daniel Moore, who supposed to have been drowned in Forty-mile canyon, has been cleared by finding the body of the unfortun Englishman some distance below scene of the accident. The Crop Outlook. — Prof. Willi Saunders, director of the Central I perimental Farm at Ottawa, who is n in the city, finds the crops of Brit Columbia looking very well. The h crops have been a good one. Oats are some instances a little lighter than it year in consequence, of the dry weath The fruit crop is a fair one, howev In the northwest he found conditions satisfactory, and the prospects excelle for a good crop. The northwest has n been affected by rust, as has been to case in some parts of Manitoba. The breaking up of large areas and the trage of the soil has had a beneficial of fect in lessening the danger from frowhich was formerly one of the gre sources of trouble to settlers. When was at Indian Head experiment station the farmers were fearful frost, but this eems to have pass away, and already the cutting has commenced.

Orchard Experiments.—In connectic with the visit of Prof. Saunders the British Columbia experimental fariat has been decided to make son changes in the methods connected withe orchard experiments. During a history of the Agassiz farm over 2,50 varieties of fruit trees have been the ed. The vast majority of these have been found to be poorly adapted for cultivation here. Prospective orchar planters have had the advantage these experiments, however, and the tests have been of the greatest benefit the constant replacing of discarded varieties by young trees of other kind has, Prof. Saunders says, given the ochard anything but an orderly appearance. The object has been, however to serve the fruit growers, and, therefore, the appearance of the plantatio was not so much sought after. Now is that the constant rees of the best kinds is order to test the fruit commercially.

San Juan.—Professor Edmund & Meany, of the history department of the University of Washington, and see retary of the Washington Universit Historical Society, who is now in the city, proposes to mark with becomin ceremony the sites of the British and American camps on San Juan island which are of historic interest to Canadians and Americans alike. Monument will be erected, one at each place, similar to that which commemorates the meeting between the two daring navigators, Vancouver and Quadra at Nootke in 1792. It will take place on October 21, the anniversary of the date or which Emperor William I. of Germany gave his decision as an arbitrator in the boundary dispute. Should the cooperation of the Natural History Secrety be secured, an effort will be made to have the British government represented by ships of the Pacific squadron, while prominent officials will be present. Excursions will be conducted from Victoria and Seattle, and there will be an international celebration, features of which will be made known later.

To Make Guano.—Says the Nanaimo Herald of yesterday: Representations have been made to Ralph Smith, M. P., that it is the intention of a Fraser river company to take fish from Nanaimo harbor for the purpose of manufacturing guano. In anticipation of this Mr. Smith has requested Mr. Sword, provincial inspector of fisheries, to come to Nanaimo to consult with the local fishing companies on this question.

At the Front.—The London Morning Post in a recent issue prints the following despatch from Mr. J. Gordon Smith: "Fusan, Aug. 18.—I have reached the front and am quartered at Haicheng, pending the advance. I rode along the line of communications of the Second Army for eleven days, and found the trarsport carts, trains, mines and occumotives, which are handled by coolies, efficient and capable of maintaining a continuous supply. The arrangements for the transport, commissariat and hospitals are excellent."

Reports on Tanana.—J. H. Rogers, general agent of the White Pass, who is in the Tanana in behalf of his company, in writing from Fairbanks, says: "The camp is on a cash basis. Credit is not given. The output thus far has been wholly without aid of outside money, which means the camp has supported itaelf. I am convinced this will be a good camp. I do not think many will leave this fall. A large number will come in by the lower river as well as the upper, and much work will be done. Clary looks to be the best stream. Fairbanks and Pedro also are good. Over \$500,000 has been taken out this year. The ground is rich in places. Many laymen are trying to buy the ground they are working. The telephone line has been completed between Chena, Fairbanks and Golden."

Swiftwater Bill.—A Dawson correspondent, writing under date of August 25, says: "Swiftwater Bill," more prosaically known as William Gates, the man who married the Lamore family and stopped only when there were no more sisters, has landed on his feet in the Tanana after as many ups and downs the last five years as usually ar experienced by an elevator man in a New York skyscraper. "Swiftwater" has bought the Hilky interests on No. 1 and No. 3 below on Cleary, together with Howard Turner. It is understood "Swiftwater" is backed by someone in the States. The last few years he has been in hard straits. In early days in
