The present high tariff which requires to e maintained now for revenue purposes should be so amended as not to discrim inate against the working classes; it should be the same for the rich and the poor, and I am therefore in favor of taking off th specific duties now levied upon textile fabrics and on such goods favor an ad valorum duty.
