The Great Forth Bridge. From the London Times The total length of the bridge is 8091 feet, or upward of a mile and a half. The length of the main portion, from cantilever pier to cantilever pier, is 5342 feet. The two main spans, north and south of Inchgarvie, are 1710 feet each. The two main half spans are 680 feet each. In the approach viaduets there are fifteen spans appreach viaduets there are misch spreach ten on the south side and five on the north ten on the south side and five on the north—of which thirteen are spans of 168 feet each, the other two, next to the cantilever plers, being of 170 feet. The height of the rails above high water will be 150 feet. The breadth of each cantilever at base is 120 feet, at top 35 feet, and at the extremities 35 feet. The height of the cantilever columns is 350 feet. The number of men employed on the works is about 2000. The estimated cost of the whole undertaking is \$8,000,000. The work has now been in progress for two years and a half. It is expected to occupy another five years at least.
