City Solicitor Biggar yesterday sent the following letter to Ald. Fleming, chairman of the Street Railway Special Committee: I beg to acknowledge your letter of F

Is the corporation of the city of Toronto in a position to enter into an agreement with the Toronto and York Street Rallway Company for the construction and operation of the lines of street rallway set forth in the option submitted to the Toronto Street Rallway Company dated on or about Nov. Slast, taking into consideration all the correspondence which has been received from the Toronto Street Rallway Company since the last mentioned date in reference to the above routes or any part thereof.

I have also to acknowledge a communication from the secretary of the Committee on Works, dated April 2, asking substantially the same question.

As the matter is one of some importance, and may perhaps result in litigation. I think it desirable to state the facts as they have been submitted to me, in order that if all the correspondence is not set before me, any error or omission may be corrected by those interested.
