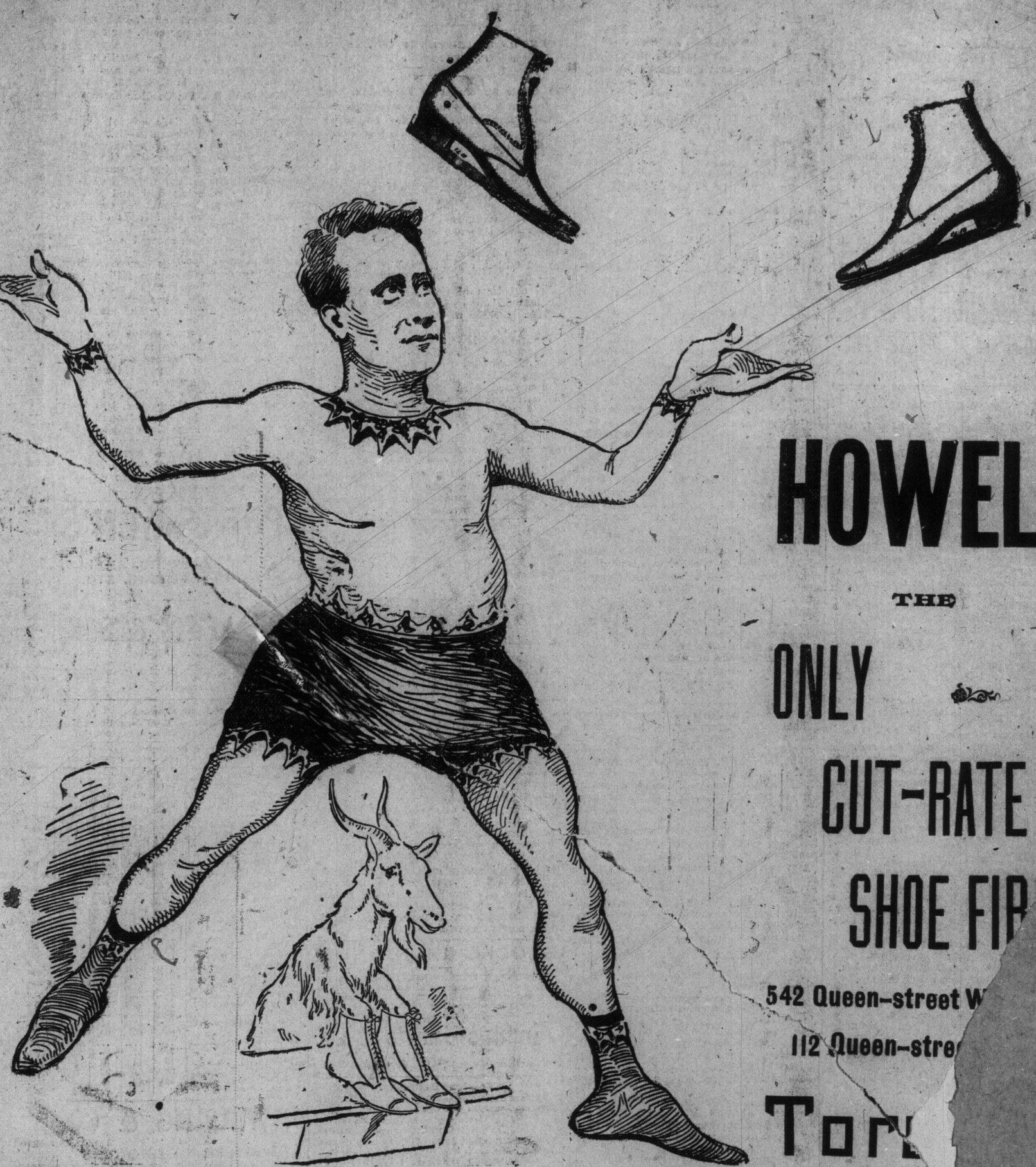

### THE AUTUMN RACES.

Good Fields at St. Annapolis. Vote Against the Amendment.  
St. Annapolis, Nov. 3.—After the last race this afternoon, racing will have a recess here until after Wednesday next, when it will be again resumed. The exact reason for postponement has taken place is to allow the party of New Yorkers to go home and put in their votes against the Constitutional Amendment, which if passed successfully will kill both running and trotting races in New York State.
