TORONTO, Oct. 28.—David J. Carson, a C. P. R. passenger conductor, was this afternoon acquitted by a jury on a charge of stealing tickets belonging

to the company.

Carson was charted with stealing tickets of the company on July 4, 20 tickets on July 29, and 20 tickets again on August 24, the day on which he was arrested. The case was largely made up of evidence of Pinkerton's National Detective Agency, of the special investigation department of the C. P. R., and of police officers of the Toronto and Hamilton police forces.
